CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, June 30, 1873, 7½ o'clock, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

The proceedings of the Regular Sessions held June 16th and 23d, 1873, were read and approved.

Sealed proposals for improving sundry streets, alleys, etc., were received, opened and read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Mr. Kahn, from the Committee on Contracts, submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, June 23, 1873.

To his Honor the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred sundry proposals for building a covered drain or sewer on Pine street from Elm street to Fletcher avenue, to connect with the sewer at that point, would report that the following have been presented:

Bruner and Riner, 24 inch cement pipe, oval, at \$3.45 per lineal foot; 24 inch oval shaped brick sewer, 4 inch wall, \$3.75 per lineal foot; manholes complete, \$45; catch basins, \$120.

Henry C. Roney, 24 inch cement pipe, oval, at \$4. per lineal foot, run; manholes \$42; catch basins \$128.

H. C. Smallwood, 24 inch cement pipe sewer per lineal foot run, \$3.75; 24 inch brick sewer, oval shaped, 4 inch wall, \$4.00 per lineal foot; manholes \$50 each; catch basins \$125.

Bruner and Riner being the lowest and best bidders, we would recommend that they be awarded the contract for the brick sewer.

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred sundry proposals for various street improvements, have examined the same and find them to be as follows, to wit:

FIRST.

For curbing with stone the outside edge of the west sidewalk on Massachusetts avenue from Delaware to Alabama street, the following proposals were presented: Bernard Hammill fifty-nine cents per lineal foot front; Henry C. Roney, fifty-seven cents per lineal foot front

Henry C. Roney being the lowest and best bidder, we would recommend that he be awarded the contract.

SECOND.

For grading and paving with brick and curbing the outside edge with stone, the west sidewalk on West street from Indiana avenue to St. Clair street, the following proposals were presented:

Henry C. Roney, 68 cents per lineal foot for paving; 60 cents per lineal foot for curbing; 58 cents per lineal foot for flagging; 75 cents per square yard for bowldering.

Bernard Hammill, 70 cents per lineal foot for paving; 59 cents per lineal foot for curbing; 58 cents per lineal foot for flagging; 72 cents per square yard for bowldering.

Henry C. Roney being the lowest and best bidder, we would recommend that he be awarded the contract.

THIRD.

For curbing the outside edge of the sidewalks and raising the bowldered gutters on Virginia avenue from Pennsylvania street to the intersection of Maryland street, the following proposals were presented:

Bernard Hammill, raising bowldered gutters, 48 cents per superficial yard; curbing, 62 cents per lineal foot run.

James W. Hudson, raising bowldered gutters, 40 cents per superficial yard; curbing, 62 cents per lineal foot run.

James W. Hudson being the lowest and best bidder, we would recommend that he be awarded the contract.

FOURTH.

For grading and graveling with hand screened river gravel, the alley running north and south through square No. 16, from Vermont to Michigan street, only one proposal was presented, and that was by Messrs. Patterson and Dunning, at 75 cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved, which your committee deem reasonable, we would therefore recommend that they be awarded the contract.

FIFTH.

For grading and graveling the first alley west of East street running north and south from Bicking to Coburn street, no proposals were presented. We would therefore recommend that the same be readvertised.

SIXTH.

For grading and graveling the first alley east of Winston street from New York to Michigan, no proposals were presented. We would also recommend that the same be readvertised.

SEVENTH.

For grading and paving with brick the south sidewalk on Fort Wayne avenue from Pennsylvania to New Jersey street, the following proposals were presented.

Sam J. Smock, 80 cents per lineal foot for paving; 60 cents per lineal foot for flagging; 75 cents superficial yard for bowldering.

Bernard Hammill, 69 cents per lineal foot for paving; 58 cents per lineal foot for flagging; 70 cents per superficial yard for bowldering.

Henry C. Roney, 58 cents per lineal foot for curbing; 75 cents per superficial yard for bowldering, and 68 cts. per lineal foot for paving.

Henry C. Roney being the lowest and best bidder we would recommend that he be awarded the contract.

EIGHTH.

For grading and bowldering the first alley east of Illinois street running from Market to Ohio street, the following proposals were presented:

Patterson and Dunning, 73 cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

Bernard Hammill 73 cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

James \dot{W} . Hudson, 72 cents per lineal foot on each side of the line improved.

James Mahoney, 70 cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

James Mahoney being the lowest and best bidder, we would recommend that he be awarded the contract.

NINTH.

For grading, paving with brick, and Lefler paving stone, the south sidewalk on New York street, from Missouri to Blake street.

Macauley & Stone, paving with brick, 65 cents per lineal foot front; flagging, 55 cents per lineal foot run; bowldering, 79 cents per superficial yard; curbing, 60 cents per lineal foot run; Lefler paving stone 30 cents per square yard.

Macauley & Stone being the only and lowest bidders, we would recommend that they be awarded the contract.

TENTH.

For grading and graveling Second street and sidewalks from Delaware to Pennsylvania street, the following proposals were presented:

James Mahoney, \$1.10 per lineal foot front. Patterson & Dunning, \$1.05 per lineal foot front.

Patterson & Dunning being the lowest and best bidders, we would recommend that they be awarded the contract.

ELEVENTH.

For grading and paving with brick the north sidewalk on Washington street from Tennessee to Mississippi street, the following proposals were presented:

Henry C. Roney, \$1.75 per lineal foot front. Bernard Hammill, \$1.52 per lineal foot front.

Bernard Hammill being the lowest and best bidder, we would recommend that he be awarded the contract.

TWELFTH.

For grading and paving with brick the north sidewalk on Washington street from Noble street to the corporation line east, the following proposals were presented:

Bernard Hammill, 77 cents per lineal foot front.

Samuel J. Smock, 75 cents per lineal foot front.

Henry C. Roney, 75 cents per lineal foot front.

Henry C. Roney being the lowest and best bidder, we would recommend that he be awarded the contract.

THIRTEENTH.

For grading and paving with brick the west sidewalk on Kentucky avenue from Tennessee to West street, the following proposals were presented:

Sam J. Smock, 70 cents per lineal foot front.

Henry C. Roney, 67 cents per lineal foot front.

James W. Hudson, 67 cents per lineal foot front.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—An ordinance has passed the Council for grading and graveling Sanders street. This street has no connection with any

other street except at the east end, and a portion of the water will have to be drained west, where there is no outlet. The same is true also of Mayhew street, which you have ordered to be graded and graveled.

I would recommend that the improvement of both of these streets be postponed until the ground in the neighborhood is subdivided and some outlet is furnished.

The ordinance for grading and graveling Alabama street directs that the water shall be drained from Home avenue to the State ditch. This will make it necessary to change the grade on Tinker street on both sides of Alabama, for which no provision has been made. You have also advertised for bids to grade and gravel Rhode Island street. To complete the drainage of this street it will be necessary to grade Locke street from Rhode Island to Margaret street. As there is no ordinance pending for the grading of Locke street, it will be well to postpone the improvement of Rhode Island street to some future time

The City Commissioners submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, June 30, 1873.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—The City Commissioners met at 9 o'clock A. M., June 23, 1873, at the City Clerk's office, pursuant to notice from that officer, to assess the damages and benefits to property and property holders, arising from the opening of an alley 9 feet wide, running east and west between East and Liberty streets, along the south line

of lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 in out-lot 62, and along the north line of lots 7, 8, 4 and 6 in out-lot H, as petitioned for by the lot owners and as ordered by your honorable body.

After hearing the statements of the owners and inspecting the premises, we submit the following report:

The damages for real estate taken are \$1,105, and for improvements taken or moved, \$40; total damages \$1,145. Benefits to property owners from opening of said alley \$1,145, making the damages and benefits equal. We think the city should pay no part of said damages or benefits.

The following schedule details the lots, owners' names and amounts of damages and benefits taxed to each:

Damages to the Germania Building Association for a strip of ground $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide off the north side of a lot 57 ft. x 197 ft. in outlot H, and being lot 7 in Little's subdivision, fronting on East street, \$350. Benefits to said Association on said lot from opening said alley, \$450. Balance of benefits to said association, \$100.

Damages to Mary E. Noble for a strip $5\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide off the south side of lot 1, in Flack's subdivision, and being 50×120 feet in outlot 62, and fronting on East street, \$500. Benefits to said Noble on said lot, \$415. Balance of damages to said Noble (to be paid by said Germania Association,) \$85.

After inspection of the premises and due consideration of the case, we submit the following assessments of the damages and benefits:

We place benefits on all the lots on each side between Market and North streets, doing so under the written consent of most of the property holders. This written consent, with the petitions, notices, order of reference, etc., are hereunto attached and returned with this report.

We estimate the value of the ground taken for said street between North street and Indiana avenue, at \$4,555. We estimate the value of the improvements taken, or to be moved from the line of said street, at \$1,255, making the total damages at the north end of said street, \$5,810. The benefits to lots and lot owners along the line of the proposed street from North street to Indiana avenue, we estimate at \$4,900. Balance of damages to lots and owners between North street and Indiana avenue, \$910.

The value of the ground taken for said street between Market and Washington streets we estimate at \$2,300. The value of the improvements taken or removed on this part of the street, we fix at \$920 Total damages resulting from opening south end of the street, \$3,220. The benefits to lots and lot owners along the south end of the street, from Market to Washington streets, we fix at \$1,850. The balance of damages to lot and lot owners on this part of the street is therefore \$1,370. The city is assessed with \$1,200 of this amount and of the \$910 at the north end of the street, leaving \$1,080 to be paid by the lot holders between Market and North streets, who are therefore assessed a sufficient sum to pay this balance, as they in equity should do.

Gentlemen—The City Commissioners met at 9 A. M., June 23, 1873, at the City Clerk's office, pursuant to an order of the Common Council, passed April 28, 1873, and to notice from the City Clerk, to take action on the petition of W. Dehne, and others, asking the opening of Michigan street, 60 feet wide, from the first alley east of Winston street, to connect with Michigan street, in Davidson's addition.

After hearing the statements of the owners, and inspecting the premises, we arrived at the following assessment of damages and benefits.

We found on beginning the examination of the case, that F. M. Churchman was the owner of a strip 62 feet wide, from the east end of the street to the old corporation line, and that Edward King was the owner of the ground east of Churchman. In both cases, and especially in Mr. Churchman's, the ground is so encumbered with the tracks and right of way of the Railway Company, that it has little or no value outside of that use, either to Churchman or King, or any one else. While so far as the Railway Company is concerned, it had merely the right to lay tracks thereon, and pass over them. If the

street be opened this right of way will still be left to the Railway Company; and even if it be interfered with to some extent by the right of way the city will acquire, still the company cannot complain, for it interferes so greatly with the public right of way on other streets, for which the Company paid nothing, that the account is vastly in favor of the city. From this consideration, and the further fact that it is utterly impossible to assess the damages to their right of way, (as it would be to estimate the damages the road does at other crossings,) we have not taken the right of way into account.

We find the total damages for ground taken to be \$550.00, and the total benefits to be \$550.00.

The damages and benefits are as follows:
