GENTLEMEN: I am directed by the Board of Park Commissioners to extend to you its sincere thanks for your recent action in making an appropriation for the building of a fence about the grounds of the City Hospital. While the Park Board has no direct concern in this matter, it has taken a great deal of interest in the plans for the building of this fence, because it has believed that the proper appearance of the City Hospital grounds would depend, in a large measure, upon the character of the fence surrounding them, and also because of the proximity of these grounds to the proposed parkway development along the south bank of Fall Creek west from Indiana avenue.

I am further directed by the members of the Board of Park Commissioners to thank the members of the Council for the interest they have taken in the work of the Park Board, and for the assistance that has been given this Department in meeting extraordinary expenses of the last two years. GENTLEMEN: We, your Committee on Ordinances, to whom was referred Special Ordinance No. 6, 1909, being "An ordinance annexing certain territory to the City of Indianapolis, and defining a part of the boundary line of said city, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect," beg leave to report that we have had the same under consideration and would recommend that Section 1 of said ordinance be amended to read as follows:

"SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the boundary lines of the City of Indianapolis be and the same are hereby extended so as to include the following described contiguous territory, all of which is hereby annexed to and made a part of the territory constituting and forming the City of Indianapolis, in Marion County, Indiana, to wit:

To the President and Members of the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Public Property and Improvement, to whom was referred General Ordinance No. 51, 1909, being "An ordinance regulating the digging of trenches and the making of other forms of excavations in the streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana; regulating the issue of permits and making of deposits therefor; providing a penalty for the violation of said ordinance and fixing a time when same shall take effect," beg leave to report that we have had the same under consideration and recommend that Sections 3 and 4 be amended to read as follows, and, when so amended, we recommend that said ordinance be passed:

"SEC. 3. Where the digging and excavation as set forth in such application is to be made in any paved or macadamized street, alley, sidewalk or other public place in said city, it shall be the duty of such applicant, before the permit provided for in the preceding section shall be issued, to make a deposit with the Department of Public Works of said city of the sum of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00, as a guarantee that the street, alley, sidewalk or other public place so dug into or excavated will be restored to as good state and condition as the same was in previous thereto. So much of said deposit, if any, as remains unexpended after the restoration aforesaid of said street, alley, sidewalk or other public place shall be returned to the depositor thereof. The amount of said deposit shall be fixed by the City Civil Engineer and shall be based upon his estimate of the amount necessary to make such restoration.

"SEC. 4. Upon the presentation of such application and the making of the deposit aforesaid, the City Civil Engineer shall issue to such applicant a written permit to make the excavation, digging or trenching in such application referred to, and shall receive from such applicant a fee of \$1.50 for such permit, which fee shall belong to the city."

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That that portion of the street in said city known as Capitol avenue, between its intersection with the north line of Indiana avenue and the north end of the bridge over Fall Creek at its intersection with said avenue, be and the same is hereby placed under the government, management and control of the Department of Public Parks of said city for the purpose and with the right upon the part of the Board of Park Commissioners of said city to convert the same into a boulevard; and said Board of Park Commissioners shall have full power upon the acceptance by it of that part of said street herein described, for the purpose aforesaid, to govern, manage, maintain, regulate and direct the public use thereof as

a boulevard, and to subject the same to its rules and regulations; subject, however, to the laws of the State and to the powers of the Common Council in relation thereto.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall be in full effect from and after its passage.

General Ordinance No. 61—1909: An ordinance fixing the salaries of officers and compensation of other members of the police force of the City of Indianapolis.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the officers and members of the police force of the City of Indianapolis shall receive the following salaries and compensation, to-wit:

(A) The salary of the chief of police shall be thirty-two hundred dollars (\$3,200) a year, payable in equal monthly installments.

(B) The captains of police and the captain of detectives shall each receive a salary of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) a year, payable in equal monthly installments.

(C) The lieutenants of police shall each receive a salary of sixteen hundred dollars (\$1,600) a year, payable in equal monthly installments.

(D) The sergeants of police, secretary to the chief of police and detectives shall each receive a salary of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400) a year, payable in equal monthly installments.

(E) Each matron shall receive a salary of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) a year, payable in equal monthly installments.

(F) Each bicycleman, chauffeur, turnkey, corner man and plain clothes man of the police force shall receive as compensation the sum of three dollars and thirty-three and one-third cents per day, payable monthly.

(G) Each patrolman and each Gamewell operator shall receive as compensation the sum of three dollars (\$3) per day, payable monthly.

SEC. 2. The salaries and compensation specified in the foregoing section of this ordinance shall be paid out of the city treasury appropriated for such purpose, at the times and in the manner provided by law.

SEC. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the first day of January, 1910.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Finance.

By Mr. Royse:

General Ordinance No. 62—1909: An ordinance amending Sections 2 and 3 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance grading certain members of the fire force of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana; fixing compensation of the members belonging to the several grades by their length of service; fixing the compensation of certain officers and employes of said force; repealing conflicting ordinances; and fixing the time when, and the conditions under which, this ordinance shall take effect," being General Ordinance No. 83—1907, approved November 18, 1907, by passing the same over the Mayor's veto.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That Sections 2 and 3 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance grading certain members of the fire force of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana; fixing compensation of the members belonging to the several grades by their length of service; fixing the compensation of certain officers and employes of said force; repealing conflicting ordinances; and fixing the time when, and the conditions under which, this ordinance shall take effect," being General Ordinance No. 83—1907, approved November 18, 1907, by passing the same over the Mayor's veto, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. Each member of the first grade shall receive a compensation of \$3.00 per day, payable in monthly installments.

"Each member of the second grade shall receive a compensation of \$2.50 per day, payable in monthly installments.

"Substitute firemen shall receive a compensation of \$2.00 per day, payable in monthly installments.

"Sec. 3. The compensation of the officers and members of said fire force, not provided for in Section 2 above, shall be as follows:

"The chief of the fire force shall receive an annual salary of thirty-two hundred (\$3,200) dollars, payable in monthly installments.

"The assistant chiefs and the superintendent of fire alarm telegraph shall each receive an annual salary of eighteen hundred (\$1,800) dollars, payable in monthly installments.

"Each captain, the chief clerk, the cellar inspector and the foreman of

fire alarm telegraph shall receive a compensation of fourteen hundred (\$1,400) dollars per year, payable in monthly installments.

"Each engineer, each lieutenant, each lineman of the fire alarm telegraph and each assistant cellar inspector shall receive a compensation of twelve hundred and fifty (\$1,250) dollars per year, payable in monthly installments."

SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and become operative from and after 12:00 o'clock noon on the first Monday in January, 1910.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Finance.

By Mr. Royse:

General Ordinance No. 63—1909: An ordinance regulating and restricting the sale of meats, fish, game, fruits, vegetables and other articles of food on certain streets in the City of Indianapolis; repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict therewith; fixing a penalty for the violation thereof, and fixing the time when the same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That it shall be unlawful for any individual, person, firm or corporation to sell, barter or trade, or to offer for sale, barter or trade, after the hour of 12 o'clock noon, on any of the regularly established market days, any meat, fish, oysters, game, fruits, vegetables, butter, eggs or other article of food, upon any part of the sidewalk or roadway of the following streets, to-wit: Delaware street, from Washington street to Ohio street; Alabama street, from Washington street to Ohio street; Washington street, from Delaware street to Alabama street; Market street, from Delaware street to New Jersey street; Wabash street, from Delaware street to Alabama street: Provided, however, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prohibit, or restrict, sales or trades by the regular occupant of any storeroom, or building abutting upon any of the aforesaid streets, upon the sidewalk or street immediately in front of such storeroom or building, by such occupant, or by any person employed by him.

SEC. 2. It shall be unlawful for the market master, assistant market master or any other servant or employe of the City of Indianapolis to receive from any individual, person, firm or corporation any fee for permission to sell or trade, or to offer for sale or trade, any article, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the market master, or other person authorized by him, to enforce the provisions of this ordinance, and he shall arrest, or cause to be arrested, any individual, person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 4. Any individual, person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than five (\$5) dollars nor more than fifty (\$50) dollars.

SEC. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SEC. 6. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication for two consecutive weeks in the Indianapolis

Commercial, a daily newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the City of Indianapolis.

By Mr. Royse:

Special Ordinance No. 12—1909: An ordinance changing the names of certain streets in the City of Indianapolis, and fixing the time when same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the name of the street known as Missouri street, north of Fall Creek, in the City of Indianapolis, be, and the same is hereby changed to Boulevard avenue; and the name of Charles avenue, from Thirty-eighth street to the city limits, hereby is changed to Rockwood avenue.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

Now, Therefore, Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the City Controller of said City of Indianapolis be, and hereby is authorized and directed to pay James McNulty, who is the present City Clerk, the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for preparing an index to the Journal of the Common Council Proceedings from January 1 to December 31, 1909, inclusive. And the City Controller is hereby authorized and directed to draw a proper warrant therefor, and charge the same to the appropriation to the Finance Department for miscellaneous expenses of city officers.
