INTRODUCTION OF SPECIAL ORDINANCES

By City Comptroller.

GENERAL ORDINANCE 49, 1929

AN ORDINANCE, authorizing the City of Indianapolis to make a temporary loan or loans in the sum of one hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000.00) for the use of the Board of Health of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, in anticipation of its current revenues, and payable out of the current revenues of said Board of Health for the year 1929, authorizing the rate of interest to be charged therefor, providing for legal notice, and fixing the time when the same shall take effect.

WHEREAS, the Board of Health of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, on the 1st day of August, 1929, will be and continue to be until the 15th day of December, 1929, without sufficient funds to meet its payroll and other current expenses for general Board of Health purposes; and

WHEREAS, the said payroll and other current expenses for said period will amount to approximately one hundred seventy-five thousand (\$175,000.00) dollars; and

WHEREAS, the second semi-annual installment of taxes levied by the said City of Indianapolis for general Board of Health purposes for the year 1928 and collectible on or before the 4th day of November, 1929, will amount to more than one hundred seventy-nine thousand three hundred seventy-five (\$179,375.00) dollars;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Board of Health of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, that an ordinance be prepared and presented to the Common Council of the said City of Indianapolis, Indiana, for passage, for the making of a temporary loan or loans by the said City of Indianapolis, Indiana, for the total principal sum of one hundred seventy-five thousand (\$175,000.00) dollars for the use of said Board of Health for said purposes, at a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum for a period not to exceed 5 months from the date of such temporary loan or loans to be made in anticipation of the current revenues of said Board of Health, collectible in the year 1929; each parcel of said loan or loans to bear interest at rate as herein provided from the time the same is checked out for the use of said Board of Health; be it further resolved by the said Board of Health that there be and is hereby appropriated out of the current revenues of the said Board of Health for the year 1929, for the purpose of paying said loan or loans together with interest thereon, as the same becomes due, the sum of one hundred seventy-nine thousand three hundred seventy-five (\$179,375.00) dollars.

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana:

Section 1. That the City Controller be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to negotiate a temporary loan or loans for the use of the Board of Health of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, in anticipation of current revenues of said Board of Health for the year 1929, said loan or loans not to exceed a total sum of one hundred seventy-five thousand (\$175,000.00) dollars and payable out of the current revenues of said Board of Health at a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum and for a period not exceeding the period set out in this ordinance. Said loan or loans shall be let to the highest and best bidder or bidders at competitive bidding on the annual rate of interest under conditions prescribed in the notice of the same, which notice shall be published for at least one day in at least one daily newspaper of general circulation published in said City of Indianapolis. The Mayor and City Controller are hereby authorized and directed to execute the proper obligations of the City of Indianapolis for the amount or amounts so delivered which obligations shall also be countersigned by the President of the Board of Health of said city. To the payment of such obligations the faith of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, is hereby irrevocably pledged.

Section 2. One hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars of said temporary loan shall be borrowed by said city so as to be available for the use of said Board of Health on the 1st day of August, 1929, and shall run for a period not to exceed five months thereafter; the remaining seventy-five thousand (\$75,000.00) dollars of said temporary loan shall be borrowed by said city so as to be available for the use of the Board of Health on September 1, 1929, and shall run for a period not to exceed

four months thereafter. Each of said installments shall bear interest from the date the same is available for the use of said Board of Health, and at a rate of interest not to exceed that herein provided.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

SPECIAL ORDINANCE NO. 13, 1929

An ordinance disannexing certain territory from the City of Indianapolis, and fixing the time when the same shall take effect.

Whereas, the majority of the owners of the real estate herein have filed with the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, county of Marion, state of Indiana, their petition addressed to said Common Council, signed by a majority of the owners of the lands and lots included in the hereinafter described territory, now in said city of Indianapolis, in which said petition said petitioners pray for the disannexation from said city of Indianapolis of the hereinafter described territory, therefore

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the city of Indianapolis, state of Indiana: Section 1. That the following described territory, now within the corporate limits of said city and a part of said city be, and the same is hereby, disannexed from the thrown out of said city of Indianapolis, to-wit:

Beginning at the present corporation line of the city of Indianapolis on the south right of way line of the Union Traction Company of Indiana, at its intersection with the center line of Emerson avenue, thence south along the center line of Emerson avenue to a point twenty (20) feet south of the south property line of Thirty-eighth (38th) street; thence west parallel to said south line of Thirty-eighth (38th) street to the extension south of the center line of the first alley east of Eastern avenue; thence north along the extension of said center line of said alley to the south right of way line of the Union Traction Company of Indiana; thence east along said right of way line to the place of beginning.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.

WHEREAS, In honesty of purpose and fidelity of thought in matters involving the government and life of our city and its citizens he had the unquestioned support of all good citizens of all political faiths, and

WHEREAS, It is proper and fitting that the Common Council of the city of Indianapolis express to the widow and to all the citizens of the city its public appreciation of Mr. Swift as a man and citizen worthy of emulation by all, THEREFORE

Be It Resolved by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana:

That the Common Council of the city of Indianapolis regrets the death of Lucius B. Swift; that in his death the City has lost a fine up-standing citizen—a man who, though fighting always for what he thought right, maintained the respect and good will of his fellow citizens, and who with it all lived serenely in the knowledge that his efforts were for honest and good purposes and that his life perhaps would add to the general well-being of the community.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in behalf of the city of Indianapolis this Council express to his widow the appreciation of the City for the life and character of Lucius B. Swift and his great public services to the City, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution be spread upon the records of the Council and that a copy thereof be sent to the widow.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Nicholson, and passed by unanimous vote.

On motion of Mr. White, seconded by Mr. Springsteen, the Council adjourned at 10:10 P. M.
