Said improvement to be done all in accordance with the details, plans and specifications submitted by the City Civil Engineer in said resolution and pursuant to the laws of the State of Indiana governing improvements of the nature contained in said Resolution No. 14310.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

GENERAL ORDINANCE 73, 1929

AN ORDINANCE, amending General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, being an ordinance concerning the government of the City of Indianapolis, providing penalties for its violation and with stated exceptions repealing all former ordinances as amended by General Ordinance No. 25, 1929, and amending sub-section B of Section B-712 of General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

Be It Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana:

Section 1. That sub-section b of Section B-712 of General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, be amended to read as follows: (Sub-section b.) Section B-712. The aggregate capacity of tanks to hold inflammable liquid with a flash point below one hundred fifty (150) degrees closed cup tester, for filling stations shall not exceed eight thousand eight hundred (8,800) gallons in any case. Such tanks may contain not to exceed two thousand two hundred (2,200) gallons each.

Section 2. That General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, being an ordinance concerning the government of the City of Indianapolis, providing penalties for its violation and with stated exceptions repealing all former ordinances as amended by General Ordinance No. 25, 1929, be amended to read as follows: Section B-714. Definition. A bulk oil storage station is herein defined as a place where crude petroleum, gasoline, naphtha, benzine, benzol, kerosine, rock oil, and earth oil, or any other liquid, except such as will stand a test of 150 degrees fahrenheit, closed cup tester, are stored in quantities, for wholesale purposes only, where the aggregate capacity of all storage tanks is more than eight thousand eight hundred (8,800) gallons.

A filling station is defined herein as a place where gasoline, kerosine, or any other fuel for operating motor vehicles, is offered for sale to the public and deliveries are made through measuring pumps or meters into the tanks of motor vehicles.

Section B-715. No filling station as defined herein shall be established, erected or installed within a radius of one hundred (100) feet of any bulk storage station as defined herein, nor shall any bulk oil storage station be constructed, erected or installed within one hundred (100) feet of any filling station as defined herein, nor shall any filling station as defined herein be constructed, erected or installed within one hundred (100) feet of any place or location where a railway company or any person, firm or corporation has established or proposes to establish an unloading place for unloading the contents of any tank car containing crude petroleum, gasoline, naphtha, benzine, camphine, carbon oil, spirit gas, burning fluids, alcohol, spirits of turpentine, kerosine, rock oil and earth oil.

Section B-716. It shall be unlawful to transfer kerosine, gasoline, or any other fuel for operating motor vehicles from any motor-driven tank, truck or horse-drawn tank wagon into the fuel tank of any motor vehicle upon the public streets, alleys or highways of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval by the mayor and publication according to law.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Parks.

GENERAL ORDINANCE 74, 1929

AN ORDINANCE amending General Ordinance No. 114, 1922, and amendments thereto, commonly known as the Zoning Ordinance.

Be It Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana:

Section 1. That the U1 or business district, the A3 or 2400 sq. ft. area district, and the H1 or 50 foot height district, be and the same are hereby amended, supplemented and extended so as to include the following described territory:

Beginning at the intersection of the south property line of 49th street and the west property line of Boulevard place; thence south on and along the west property line of Boulevard place a distance of 93.94 feet to a point; thence west to a point in the east property line of Cornelius avenue; said point being 94.3 feet south of the south property line of 49th street; thence north on and along the east property line of Cornelius avenue a distance of 11.0 feet to a point; thence west parallel to and 83.3 feet south of the south property line of 49th street to a point in the east property line of Hinesley avenue; thence south on and along the east property line of Hinesley avenue a distance of 14.64 feet to a point; thence west parallel to and 97.94 feet south of the south property line of 49th street to the center line of the 1st alley east of Sunset avenue; thence north on and along the center line of said alley a

distance of 97.94 feet to a point in the south property line of 49th street; thence east on and along the south property line of 49th street to the west property line of Boulevard place, the point or place of beginning.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval by the mayor, and publication according to law.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Parks.

Appropriation Ordinance 13, 1929, was read a third time by the Clerk, and passed by the following roll-call vote:

Ayes, 7, viz: Mr. Buchanan, Mr. Harris, Mr. Lieber, Mr. Rathert, Mr. Springsteen, Mr. White, and Pres. Raub.

President Raub announced that certain matters relat-

ing to the 1930 budget had been called to his attention, and asked the consent of the Council to appoint a special committee to investigate. The following committee was appointed: Mr. Buchanan, Chairman; Mr. Springsteen, Mr. Lieber, Mr. Harris, Mr. Nicholson.

Mr. Lieber asked for a Public Hearing on General Ordinance 74, 1929, for the first meeting in October. The Clerk was instructed to advertise a hearing for that date.

On motion of Mr. White, seconded by Mr. Harris, the Council adjourned at 8:10 P. M.
