INTRODUCTION OF APPROPRIATION ORDINANCES

By City Controller:

APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE No. 7, 1930

AN ORDINANCE appropriating the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) out of the unexpended and unappropriated balance remaining in the general fund for the year 1930 to the Board of Public Safety, to be used in paying the cost and expenses incident to the operation of the refrigeration plant in the city market, and fixing a time when said ordinance shall take effect.

WHEREAS, The Board of Public Safety of the City of Indianapolis, after thorough investigation by its own resolution duly adopted and spread of record, has decided to take over and operate the refrigeration plant in the city market on and after June 26, 1930; and,

WHEREAS, For a number of years said refrigeration plant has been operated by private individuals under a lease from said board, which lease will expire on June 26, 1930; and,

WHEREAS, It is estimated that the receipts from said stand owners in said city market for said refrigeration service from June 26, 1930, to December 31, 1930, will be approximately Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), and it is further estimated that the cost of operating said refrigeration plant from June 26, 1930, to December 31, 1930, will be approximately Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00); and,

WHEREAS, Said board by its said resolution has found that it is necessary to continue the operation of said refrigeration plant and

thereby requiring the expenditure of sums of money not anticipated at the time of the adoption of the budget of said department for the fiscal year 1930, and is therefore not provided for in said budget; and,

WHEREAS, An extraordinary emergency exists for the appropriation of said sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for the purposes herein set forth. Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That an extraordinary emergency exists for the appropriation of the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to the Board of Public Safety for the purposes hereinafter set forth.

Sec. 2. That the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) out of the unexpended and unappropriated balance remaining in the general fund for the year 1930 be and the same is hereby set apart and appropriated to the Board of Public Safety of the City of Indianapolis, to be used by said board in paying the cost and expenses incident to the operation of the refrigeration plant in the city market of the City of Indianapolis, said cost and expenses to be incurred and accounted for by said Board of Public Safety as by law required.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the Mayor and publication according to law.

APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE No. 8, 1930

AN ORDINANCE appropriating the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00) to be received from the sale of the "Municipal Certificate Funding Bonds of 1930, Second Issue," to the Board of Public Works of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, for the purpose of pay-

ing and retiring certificates of indebtedness and interest thereon as set forth in General Ordinance No. 35, 1930, as amended; declaring an emergency and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

WHEREAS, By and pursuant to General Ordinance No. 35, 1930, Municipal Certificate Funding Bonds of 1930, Second Issue, in the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00) have been authorized and are now in the process of advertisement and sale; and,

WHEREAS, The aforesaid sum is in excess of the budget appropriations for the year 1930; and,

WHEREAS, An extraordinary emergency exists for the appropriation for the amount to be received from the sale of said bonds. Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That an extraordinary emergency exists for the appropriation and expenditure of the proceeds to be received from the sale of the "Municipal Certificate Funding Bonds of 1930, Second Issue," issued pursuant to General Ordinance No. 35, 1930.

Sec. 2. That the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00) to be received from the sale of the Municipal Certificate Funding Bonds of 1930, Second Issue, be and the same is hereby appropriated to the Board of Public Works of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, for the purpose of paying and retiring certificates of indebtedness and interest thereon as set forth in said General Ordinance No. 35, 1930.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor.

INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

By Board of Public Safety:

GENERAL ORDINANCE No. 47, 1930

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 30, Article VI, of General Ordinance No. 96, 1928, by striking out sub-division (39) of said Section 30 and substituting in lieu thereof the following words and figures: "(39) Sixteenth Street, on both sides, from Capitol Avenue to Alabama Street," and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That Section 30, Article VI, of General Ordinance No. 96, 1928, be amended by striking out sub-division (39) of said Section 30 and substituting in lieu thereof the following words and figures: "(39) Sixteenth Street, on both sides, from Capitol Avenue to Alabama Street," so that said Section 30 will read as follows:

"Section 30. *Parking Prohibited in Certain Places.* (a) On all streets and avenues thirty (30) feet or less in width from curb to curb the parking of vehicles shall be restricted to one side of such street or avenue; if such street or avenue runs north and south parking of vehicles shall be on the west side only; if such street or avenue runs east and west parking of vehicles shall be on the south side only, except as otherwise provided herein.

(b) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to park the same at any time in any of the following places:

(1) On both sides of North Alabama Street, from Fort Wayne Avenue to Eleventh Street.

(2) On both sides of Bird Street, between Ohio and New York Streets.

(3) Belmont Street, on the west side, from Washington Street to Oliver Avenue.

(4) On both sides of Central Avenue, from Tenth to Eleventh Street.

(5) Clifton Street, on the east side, from Roach to Thirty-fourth Street.

(6) Eleventh Street, on the north side, from Illinois to Pennsylvania Street.

(7) Eleventh Street, on the north side, from Alabama to Central Avenue.

(8) Fort Wayne Avenue, on the east side, from Pennsylvania to St. Clair Street.

(9) Fortieth Street, on the north side, from Illinois Street to Boulevard Place.

(10) Forty-second Street, on the north side, from Carrollton to College Avenue.

(11) Forty-second Street, on the south side, from Central to College Avenue.

(12) Forty-sixth Street, on the south side, from Illinois Street to Monon R. R.

(13) Fourteenth Street, on the south side, from Illinois to Meridian Street.

(14) Fourteenth Street, on the south side, from Meridian to Pennsylvania Street.

(15) Georgia Street, on the north side, from Noble to East Street.

(16) Hawthorne Lane, on the west side, from Washington Street to Lowell Avenue.

(17) Highland Drive, on the south side, from Broadway to College Avenue.

(18) Howard Street, on the north side, from Harding Street to Belmont Avenue.

(19) Illinois Street, on the east side, from Washington Street to Pearl Street.

(20) Illinois Street, on the east side, between Washington Street and a point forty (40) feet north of Washington Street.

(21) Meridian Street, on the east side, from Washington to Pearl Street.

(22) Meridian Street, on the west side, from Bluff Avenue to Belt R. R.

(23) West New York Street, on the south side, Blake Street to White River.

(24) New York Street, on the north side, from the Big Four R. R. to Emerson Avenue, including Marlowe Avenue between Dorman and Arsenal Streets.

(25) Nineteenth Street, on the south side, from Illinois to Meridian Street.

(26) Nineteenth Street, on the south side, from Delaware to New Jersey Street.

(27) Park Avenue, on the west side, from Ruckle to Forty-second Street.

(28) Pratt Street, on the north side, from Pennsylvania to Illinois Street.

(29) Pennsylvania Street, on the west side, from Washington to Court Street.

(30) Osage Street, on the west side, between Ohio and New York Street.

(31) Ruckle Street, on the east side, from Thirty-eighth to Forty-second Street.

(32) Ruckle Street, on the west side, from Park Avenue to Forty-second Street.

(33) St. Clair Street, on the north side, from Senate Avenue to the Monon R. R.

(34) St. Joseph Street, on the north side, from Pennsylvania to Illinois Street.

(35) St. Joseph Street, on the north side, from Fort Wayne Avenue to Alabama Street.

(36) Seventeenth Street, on both sides, between Meridian and Pennsylvania Streets.

(37) Seventeenth Street, on the north side, from Park Avenue to Talbott Avenue.

(38) Sixteenth Street, on the north side, from Senate Avenue to Monon R. R.

(39) Sixteenth Street, on both sides, from Capitol Avenue to Alabama Street.

(40) Salem Street, on the west side, from Thirty-fourth to Thirty-eighth Street.

(41) Station Street, on the east side, from Roosevelt Avenue to Twenty-fifth Street.

(42) Tenth Street, on the north side, from Meridian Street to Indiana Avenue.

(43) Tenth Street, on the south side, from Capitol Avenue to the first alley west.

(44) Thirtieth Street, on the north side, from Fall Creek to White River.

(45) Twelfth Street, on the south side, from Meridian Street to Alabama Street.

(46) Walnut Street, on the north side, from Pennsylvania Street to Fort Wayne Avenue.

(47) Washington Street, from Oriental Street east and west to points 150 feet distant therefrom.

(48) Oriental Street, on the east side, from Southeastern Avenue north to Market Street.

(49) Johnson Avenue, on both sides, from Washington Street to the first alley south.

(50) Johnson Avenue, on the west side, from first alley south of Washington Street to Julian Avenue.

(51) Ritter Avenue, on both sides, from Washington Street a distance of two hundred (200) feet north and south thereof.

(52) Orange Street, on south side, from Leonard to Shelby Street.

(53) At the inner curb of Monument Circle.

(c) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to park the same in any of the following places between the hours of 6:00 a. m. and 6:00 p. m., except Sunday and legal holidays:

(1) Henry Street, on the north side, from Illinois to Meridian Street.

(2) Liberty Street, on the west side, from North to Walnut Street.

(3) Noble Street, on the east side, from Virginia Avenue to Massachusetts Avenue.

(4) North Street, on the north side, from Cincinnati to Noble Street.

(5) Walnut Street, on the south side, from Liberty to Noble Street.

(d) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to park the same in any of the following places at any time, except temporarily during the actual loading or unloading of passengers or when necessary in obedience to traffic regulations or traffic signs or signals or the directions of a police officer:

(1) Within a space of twenty-five (25) feet immediately in front of the entrance of any church, school, hotel, theater, motion picture house, hospital, steam railway station, bus or interurban station, public meeting hall or public meeting place.

(2) Within any street or alley in the congested district as defined in this ordinance, where the width of same is less than forty (40) feet from curb to curb, which streets and alleys must be designated by the Board of Public Safety by appropriate signs on said streets and alleys, except on the south side of Court Street and the north side of Wabash Street, between Delaware and Pennsylvania Streets, from 6:30 p. m. to 2:00 a. m."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor.

GENERAL ORDINANCE No. 48, 1930

AN ORDINANCE amending Section 1 of General Ordinance No. 22, 1930, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That Section 1 of General Ordinance No. 22, 1930, authorizing the issue and sale of one hundred sixty-six (166) bonds of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, each in the principal sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and adopted by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, on the 7th day of April, 1930, be amended only insofar as to the form of the bond set out in said section, and the form of the bond set out in said section is amended and shall be substantially in the following words and figures, to wit:

CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS

MUNICIPAL STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS OF 1930,

FIRST ISSUE

Total Issue, \$166,000.00

For value received, the City of Indianapolis, Marion County, State of Indiana, hereby promises to pay to the bearer on the first day of January, 19...., at the City Treasurer's Office of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana,

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS

in lawful money of the United States of America, together with interest thereon at the rate of four and one-half per cent (4½%) per annum from the first day of June, 1930, until paid, payable on the first day of July, 1931, and thereafter semi-annually on the first days of January and July, respectively, upon the presentation of the proper interest coupons hereunto attached and which are made a part of this bond.

This bond is one of an issue of one hundred and sixty-six (166) bonds of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each, numbered from one (1) to one hundred and sixty-six (166), both inclusive, of date of June 1, 1930, which bonds shall mature in twenty (20) series. The first nineteen (19) series shall consist of eight (8) bonds of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each and the twentieth (20th) series shall consist of fourteen (14) bonds of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each. The first series of eight (8) bonds shall be due and payable on July 1, 1932, and one of said series shall be due and payable on the first day of July each year thereafter up to and including July 1, 1951. These bonds are issued by the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, pursuant to an ordinance duly passed by the Common Council of said city on the seventh day of April, 1930, and by virtue of the laws of the State of Indiana, including an act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, entitled "An Act Concerning Municipal Corporations," approved March 6, 1905, and all acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto. The object of this issue is to secure a total fund of One Hundred and Sixty-six Thousand Dollars (\$166,000.00) duly appropriated by the ordinance aforesaid for the use of the Board of Public Works of said City of Indianapolis to resurface and widen and resurface certain designated streets in said City of Indianapolis, and also for the purpose of paving and curbing the Delaware Street bridge approaches at Fall Creek in said city.

It is hereby certified that all conditions, acts and things essential to the validity of this bond exist, have happened and have been done, and that all requirements of the law affecting the issuance thereof have been duly complied with, and that this bond is within every debt and other limit prescribed by the Constitution and laws of the State of Indiana, and that the faith and credit of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal and interest of this bond according to its terms.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana, has caused this bond to be signed

by the Mayor and City Controller, and attested by the City Clerk and the corporate seal of said city to be affixed and the interest coupons hereunto attached. Signed by the facsimile signatures of said Mayor and City Controller this fourth day of June, 1930, as of the first day of June, 1930.

GENERAL ORDINANCE No. 50, 1930

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section A-104, Part I of Division A of Section 865, of General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, entitled "An Ordinance Concerning the Government of the City of Indianapolis, Providing Penalties for Its Violation, and with Stated Exceptions Repealing All Former Ordinances," and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That Section A-104, Part I, Division A, of General Ordinance No. 121, 1925, be amended by inserting immediately after the

word "serve" in line 2 of paragraph (a) of said Section A-104 the words "without compensation," and by striking out of and from said Section A-104 all of paragraph (c) thereof, so that said Section A-104 will read as follows:

Section A-104. (a) The examining board shall be composed of nine (9) members appointed by the Mayor to serve without compensation as a Board of Examiners to examine all applicants as outlined in this ordinance. Such Board of Examiners shall be composed of one (1) structural engineer, one (1) electrical engineer, one (1) mechanical engineer, one (1) combustion engineer, one (1) master builder familiar with fire-resisting building construction, one (1) architect, one (1) employing plumber, the City Civil Engineer, and the Secretary of the City Board of Health and Charity. All members of said board, except the master plumber, master builder, and the Secretary of the Board of Health, shall be regularly registered professional engineers registered under the laws of the State of Indiana.

(b) The City Civil Engineer shall be chairman of the board.

(c) Such examining board shall serve as such until another board is appointed by the Mayor.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.
