

PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

REGULAR SESSION—APRIL 21, 1880.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis met in the Aldermanic Chamber, on Wednesday evening, April 21st, A. D. 1880, at half past seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—His Honor, the President, J. M. Ridenour, in the Chair, and Aldermen Chandler, Coburn, Drew, Grubbs, Layman, Mussmann, Newman, Piel, and Seibert—10.

ABSENT—None.

The proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, for the regular session, held on April 7th, 1880, having been printed, and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, on motion by Alderman Grubbs, said proceedings were corrected by substituting the words "Michigan street" for the words "Washington street," where they appear in S. O. 28, 1880, on page 1,033, *ante*. The Proceedings as corrected, were then approved as published.

- S. O. 40, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering the east gutter, and curbing with stone, the outer edge of the east sidewalk (except where already curbed and bowldered,) of Alabama street, from Louisiana street to South street.
- S. O. 41, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Newman street and sidewalks, from Seventh street to Ninth or Bolton street.
- S. O. 42, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the first alley north of St. Marys street, from Delaware street to Pennsylvania street.
- S. O. 43, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering the northwest gutter, and curbing with stone, the outer edge of the northwest sidewalk, of Fort Wayne avenue, from St. Mary street to St. Joseph street.
- S. O. 44, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering the southeast gutter, and curbing with stone, the outer edge of the southeast sidewalk of Kentucky avenue, from Louisiana street to Sharpe street.
- S. O. 45, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering West street, and grading the sidewalks to make a width of twenty-five feet, and curbing the outer edge thereof with stone, (except where already curbed,) from Washington street to Kentucky avenue.
- Ap. O. 25, 1880—An Ordinance appropriating money for the payment of sundry claims against the city of Indianapolis.

On motion by Alderman Layman, the rules were suspended, by the following vote, for the purpose of placing Ap. O. 25, 1880, and S. O. 25, 32, 41, and 42, 1880, on their second and third reading, and final passage, viz:

Alderman Layman moved to amend the ordinance by deducting the sum of \$1,156.80 (amount expended by the city of Indianapolis on account of the "Gregg bequest,") from \$8,281.21, the amount in the item "H. G. Carey, Treas'r. of Schood Board, on account of moneys collected from the Gregg estate, \$8,281.21"—leaving net amount to be paid to said Carey of \$7,124.41; and that the City Clerk be directed to file with the School Board an itemized account.

Which amendment was adopted.

The ordinance as amended was then ordered to be engrossed, read the third time, and passed by the following vote :

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES.

Alderman Coburn, from the Committee on Bridges, submitted the following estimate of cost :

To the Aldermanic Committee on Bridges :

Gentlemen:—I have examined the bridge on Blackford street, over the Canal, and find that there will have to be some work done on the irons of the Delaware street viaduct used in the construction of the same, which I cannot give the exact cost; but to make a double truss abutment of heavy oak timber, the entire work will not cost to exceed \$500.00.

The Committee on Finance, through Alderman Layman, submitted the following report :

To the President and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis :

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Finance, to whom the following motion was referred (adopted by the Common Council April 5, 1880,) viz: "That the City Assessor be, and is hereby, directed to pay the Deputy City Assessors two (\$2.00) dol-

lars per day, for each and every day actually employed," recommend that the compensation of the Deputy City Assessors be fixed at the sum of one dollar and seventy-five (\$1.75) cents per day instead of two (\$2.00) dollars per day as proposed; and that the City Attorney be instructed to prepare an ordinance amending the present salary ordinance in accordance with this recommendation.

NEW BUSINESS.

Alderman Coburn presented the following remonstrance; which, together with S. O. 44, 1880, was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

To the Board of Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your petitioners, owners of the property abutting on the line of the improvement, respectfully remonstrate and protest against the passage of S. O. 44, 1880, an ordinance for bowldering and curbing the southeast gutter of Kentucky avenue, from Louisiana street to Sharpe street, for the reasons that said work is unnecessary at present, and that the roadway of said avenue requires attention in a much more pressing degree than the gutters do, &c.

And your petitioners represent that if the roadbed of said avenue is graveled and repaired between said streets, and the gutters, as they exist at present, cleaned out, that the obstacles to travel over said avenue will be removed, but that the expensive improvements to the gutter and sidewalk contemplated in said ordinance, will be of no service or benefit to the traffic on said avenue. And your petitioners will ever pray, &c.
