Mr. Samuel Henderson petitioned the City Council that they refund to him the sum of \$1.50, he having paid that amount as cost for advertising his property for sale, as delinquent by the Treasurer because of an error in assessment upon which statement.

On motion of Woodward

The said sum of \$1.50 was directed to be refunded him by the Treasurer.

The following petition was presented:

"To the City Council of Indianapolis,

We the undersigned property holders on the east side of the Square formerly occupied by Underhill's foundry would respectfully petition your honorable body for leave to grade the west sidewalk of Pennsylvania Street opposite said square. On motion by Mr. Pitts, The prayer of the said petitioner was granted and it was Ordered That the City Engineer set the grade marks for said improvement.

The committee to Revise Ordinances reported an ordinance entitled "An ordinance in relation to the occupation of Louisiana Street by the Lawrenceburg and Upper Mississippi Railroad Company."

Mr. Buchanan moved to lay it on the table.

So the motion to lay on the table was not adopted.

On motion by Mr. Woodward The Ordinance was adopted.

The committee on Revision reported ordinances generally entitled, "An ordinance relative to the officers of the City and their duties", "An ordinance relative to the public burying grounds and for the protection of public and private burying grounds in the city of Indianapolis" & "An ordinance relative to nuisances and other offences against the police of the City of Indianapolis". which were, after alteration and amendment, adopted. Mr. Louden presented the bill of Central Plank Road Company for 25 rods of paving stone for Illinois Street, amt. \$25.00.

Referred to committee on Claims.

The President read an invitation, inviting the members of the City Council to be present at the examinations and exhibitions of the Schollars of the Schools held in City School, at times specified in invitation.
