## PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

## REGULAR SESSION—August 26, 1889.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, August 26th, A. D. 1889, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapelis, That there be, and is hereby, assessed and levied upon all real estate, personal an real property, notes, bonds, stocks and choses in action, in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, assessed and returned for taxation in and for said city, for the year 1889, a tax f r general city purposes of ninety (90) cents upon each one hundred dollars valuation of all such property, and the further sum of fifty cents on each poll for general purposes; and

Resolved, further, That the Auditor of Marion county, Indiana, be, and he is hereby, ordered and directed to place said taxes up n the proper tax duplicate, and the County Treasurer of said county be, and he is hereby, ordered to collect the same for said City of Indianapolis, and make due report thereof.

The City Clerk is hereby ordered to deliver to said Auditor and said Treasurer certified copies of this resolution.

That the City Clerk be instructed to insert in the next appropriation ordinance the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for the benefit of the Committee of the Soldiers' Monument.

The report from the City Treasurer for the month of July, 1889, (see page 598, ante), was read and received.

The report from the Committee on Fire Department, as to the building of a fire cistern at the corner of Carloss and Ray streets, (see page 598, ante), was read, and the action of the Common Council thereon, concurred in.

The report from the Committee on Public Charities, in reference to the disposition of the horse owned by the Board of Health, was read, and referred to the Committee on Public Property.

The following report from the Committee on Public Light, (see page 599, ante), was read:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Public Light, to whom was referred the motion asking for the re-mantling of gas lamps on the north side of Clifford avenue, would recommend that the first lamp west of Brookside avenue, on the north side of Clifford avenue, be re-mantled, and that all of the dismantled lamps, eight in number, on the north side of Clifford avenue, east of Brookside avenue, be re-mantled.

The report of the Committee on Contracts, on bids submitted for improving Pennsylvania street, from Washington street to Ohio street, under S. O. 105, 1889, (see page 600, ante), was read, and the action of the Common Council concurred in, and the contract awarded to The Western Paving and Supply Company.

The following motions (see pages 603, 604 and 608, ante), were read, and concurrently adopted:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to clean up the gutters on Bloomington street, from Washington street north to White River; cost not to exceed \$10.00.

That the City Clerk be, and is hereby, instructed to notify The Western Union Telegraph Company to remove their telegraph poles from the center of the sidewalk to the curb line on the west side of Missouri street, from Merrill street to Washington street. If said poles are not removed within ten days, the Street Commissioner to do the work at the expense of the Western Union Telegraph Company.

That the City Attorney be ordered to draw up an ordinance licensing all dealers in oleomargarine or butterine, and that the license fee be not less than one hundred dollars, to go into the general fund.

That the City Attorney be, and is hereby, directed to notify the L., N. A. & C. R. R. Co. to at once repair the sidewalks at the crossing of their tracks and the following named streets: Home avenue, Lincoln avenue, Seventh street, Eighth street and Ninth str et.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to notify J. V. McKernan to remove the steps and other obstructions from the sidewalk on the corner of McCarty and Tennessee streets; and if not done within ten days after being so notified, to do the work and collect the cost thereof from said McKernan.

That the Market Master be instructed to have the walls of the Meat Market whitewashed, the cost of the same not to exceed forty dollars (\$40,00.)

That Wm. H. Wishard and David T. Wiggington be, and are hereby, granted permission to widen the sidewalk and bowlder and curb the west gutter of Pine street, from Huron street to Elm street, at their own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

The following petition (see page 608, ante), was read, and the action of the Common Council thereon, concurred in:

3d. All of J. H. Ruddel's subdivision of Lots fifty-one (51) and sixty (60) of Burton & Campbell's Park Place Addition to the City of Indianapolis, as recorded in Plat Book 3, page 143, in the Recorder's office of Marion county, Indiana.

4th. All of Block 6, and Lots 31, 32, 33 and 34, in Central Park Addition to the City of Indianapolis, as recorded in Plat Book 6, page 142, in the Recorder's office of Marion county, Indiana.

5th. All of Alexander Metzger's Park Place Addition to the City of Indianapolis, as recorded in Plat Book 9, page 129, in the Recorder's office of Marion county, Indiana.

Alderman Tousev presented the following remonstrance: which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys, with the ordinance—S. O. 142, 1880:

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:-The undersigned, your petitioners, would respectfully represent that they have incidentally learned of the passage of an ordinance by the Common Council of said city, to wit: Special Ordinance No. 142, for the grading and paving with brick the south side of Tenth street, in said city.

They would further represent that, in their opinion, there is no need of said improvement at the present time; that said sidewalk has heretofore been graded and graveled at the expense of your petitioners, and is at this time in good condition, being dry and well packed. Further, that a good brick sidewalk has already been made on the north side of said street, which is of sufficient capacity to accommo-

date all pedistrians passing along said street.

And they would further represent that said Common Council, together with your honorable body, have passed an ordinance providing for the improvement of Tenth street, from Illinois to Meridian streets, in which you have provided for gravel sidewalks. Your petitioners would represent that there is no more use for a brick sidewalk on the square lying between Tennessee street and Illinois street, than there is on the square lying between Illinois street and Meridian street. Your petitioners would therefore respectfully remonstrate against your concurrence in the action of the said Common Council in the passage of said ordinance.
