

PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR SESSION—SEPTEMBER 2, 1889.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, September 2d, A. D. 1889, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Caleb S. Denny, Mayor, and *ex officio* President of the Common Council in the Chair, and 17 members, viz: Councilmen Burns, Cummings, Darnell, Davis, Gasper, Hicklin, Johnston, Long, Markey, McClelland, Pearson, Smith, Stuckmeyer, Swain, Thalman, Trusler, and Wilson.

Sealed proposals for the construction of a bridge over the State Ditch on Pennsylvania street, were opened, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Now, therefore, If the above bounden, the Indianapolis Brush Electric Light and Power Company, will comply with all the provisions of said entitled ordinance, and of all other ordinances which may hereafter be passed by the City of Indianapolis relating to incandescent and arc electric lighting—the provisions of which said en-

titled ordinances are made a part of this contract as fully and effectually as if herein copied at full length—then this obligation shall be void and of no effect, otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

Councilman Gasper submitted the following report:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Special Committee, to whom was referred the communication of the Board of Health, respecting the complaints made against the factory of E.

Rauh & Sons, recently burned on the Belt Road, report that we have personally examined the premises and surroundings, and in addition to this have examined and heard statements of about two hundred persons. Of these, about thirty state that the establishment is a nuisance, while the balance—being much the larger number—state that prior to its destruction by fire, it was not a nuisance; but that since its destruction, the odors emitted from the burning and putrid matter, have been very offensive, but such matter has since been removed to the Sellers Farm.

It is the judgment of your Committee that the business of E. Rauh & Sons, when running, was not a nuisance, as was shown by the evidence of more than two-thirds of the witnesses. Therefore we would respectfully recommend that E. Rauh & Sons be granted permission to run said factory; and if at any time it becomes a nuisance, it can be abated as provided by law.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, residents of your city, desire respectfully to call your attention to a long-standing annoyance to ourselves and the public, and ask that you will consider the matter carefully, and if within the scope of your powers as law makers, that you well devise some means for the relief of your petitioners and the public generally from the same.

The matter of sprinkling the streets, a thing of unquestioned utility when properly performed, but as it is now, and has been done for some time past, is one of the most noticeable sources of inconvenience and discomfort that is to be found in our city,—one that indeed has become an intolerable nuisance, streets not being as they should, only being sprinkled sufficiently to keep down the dust, leaving them comparatively dry and pleasant thoroughfares with respectable crossings, instead of which nearly all our principal streets are literally flooded once or twice daily, leaving pools of water at crossings and street car tracks, and in ruts or hollow places, are constantly filled with muddy water, to be splashed by wheels and horses' feet upon the passers by, or to remain as the beginning of mud holes of no small size with which many of our roadways now abound. The streets constantly covered with mud, deep as the dust will make it, through which no vehicle can be kept clean

for two squares driving, crossings unfit for ladies to use, they being constantly compelled to soil their skirts or their feet soaked with water or covered with mud, if they attempt to cross the street or get in or out of the carriage.

This unnecessary waste or mischievous use of water is mostly chargeable to the use of street sprinklers who are filling contracts on the streets for the same. Although in part it is due to those who keep hose, and allow their children or servants to amuse themselves for hours in slopping the streets and flooding the gutters in their vicinity, to the great annoyance of their neighbors, and to passers by.

As the streets are public property, they should be kept for their legitimate uses as thoroughfares, and whatever interferes or perverts the same, should surely be the subject of law. We therefore trust and hereby request that you establish some gauge which should regulate the matter and save the citizens from the inconvenience to which they are now subjected.


