# REGULAR SESSION—November 4, 1889.

The City Attorney submitted the following report, which was read; and on motion of Councilman Cummings, that part relating to the viaduct, laid over until the next meeting of the Council:

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—I submit to you a report of matters in my Department since your last meeting:

1st. The Supreme Court has affirmed the decision of the Circuit Court in the cases of Charles H. Bush vs. The City of Indianapolis, and William Moore vs. The City of Indianapolis. These cases involved the constitutionality of the \$250 liquor law of 1889; and the Moore case especially raised the question of the validity of the ordinance imposing the \$250 license fee provided for in said act. The opinions of Judges Coffey and Mitchell, and concurred in by the full bench, appeared in the daily papers, and sustained both the Act of the Legislature and the ordinance of the city. The result is that all of the money already paid in on these licenses, will be retained, and about \$34,000 in bank, deposited to await the decision in these cases, will also be immediately paid into the city treasury.

2d. In accordance with your instructions, I have prepared the necessary papers for entering suit to compel the Union Railway Company to build a viaduct on the alley between Meridian and Pennsylvania streets; but to day Messrs. John T. Dye and Edward Daniels, Attoyners for the Indianapolis Union Railway Company, had a conference with the Mayor and myself, the result of which was that they agreed to recommend to the Union Railway Company to immediately advertise for bids for the construction of the proposed viaduct; and this afternoon wrote to Mr. Ingalls, President of said company, advising him to cause bids to be immediately advertised for for the construction of said viaduct.

Therefore, unless otherwise ordered, I shall consider this, for the present, at least, a compliance with the order of your honorable bodies.

Indianapolis, November 4, 1889.

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen: - Your attention is respectfully invited to the following facts: That on the 4th day of May, 1880, under the provisions of law then in force affecting said city, (see Acts 1867-33 to 77, Rev. Statutes 1870-63 to 111, Davis' Revision, 1876, volume 1-267 to 314), as amended by the Act of 1877, (see Acts 1877-9 to 12,) he was duly elected a member of the Common Council from the 22d Ward of said city, to serve for the term of one year, and until his successor should be duly elected and qualified; That on the 6th day of May, 1880, he took the oath of office and filed his certificate of election with the City Clerk, and immediately entered upon the discharge of his duties (see Proceedings of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen, May 10, 1880, to May 4, 1881,) and was by law entitled to hold said office until the election and qualification of his successor; That at the next election, held on May 3, 1881, under the Act of 1881, (see Act 1881-14 to 17, and Section 3,051 to 3,060, R. S. 1881,) petitioner and his opponent each received an equal number of votes, and it became the duty of the Council to order a new election, which the Council refused to do, (see Proceedings May 9, 1881, page 6,) at which time I attended the meeting of said body, and was and continued to be until the 1st day of January, 1884, eligible to fill said office; and although able and ever anxious to discharge the duties of said office, was not permitted to do so.

That on the 10th day of May. 1880, I began quo warranto proceedings in cause 27,906 of the Superior Court, to test my right to said office; which suit, however, was not tried until the 9th and 10th days of February, 1885, and on the 2d day of March, 1885, the Honorable Daniel Waite Howe, presiding in Room 2, decided the case in my favor, as shown by the record in said cause (see Entry Docket 35, O. B. 96, 336; O. B. 91, 78; O. B. 97, 20, 56; O. B. 119, 508; O. B. 120, 280, and O. B. 124, 381, 383 and 446.) This judgment determined my right to the office, but as it was not tried until after the term for which I would have held over, to-wit, May 1881 to D cember 31. 1883, had expired, it was of no direct benefit to me, and the emoluments of the office, \$150.00 per year, or \$400.00 for the whole time, was not

paid me.

Under the decisions of the Supreme Court in the cases Glasscock vs. Lyons, 20 Ind., page 1, and Douglass vs. The State, 31 Ind, 429, as well as under the precedent established by the Council July 20, 1863, in the matter of Henry Geisel (see pages 147 and 148, Proceedings of that date,) who by wrongful action of the Council in keeping him from serving as a Councilman from the 9th Ward, was nevertheless declared entitled to, and did receive his pay, I am entitled to said \$400.00, as a matter of law and equity, and so ask that the same be allowed me by incorporating an item for that amount in the proper appropriation ordinance; and your petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.
