## REPORTS, ETC., FROM COMMITTEE ON CONTRACTS.

The Committee on Comtracts, through Councilman Darnell, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

## REPORTS, ETC., FROM CITY OFFICERS.

The City Attorney submitted the following report, which was read, and the City Clerk and City Civil Engineer instructed to hereafter advertise in the Indianapolis Sun, as per contract heretofore made:

#### To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Since your last meeting, the cases of J. A. Dynes & Co. vs. The City, and McMillan vs. The City, have both been disposed of, and in both cases have the suits resulted in favor of the City. Both of these suits were brought to enjoin the city from continuing its legal advertisements in "The Sun," for the reason, as it was alleged in the Dynes case, that the city had an unexpired contract with said Dynes at the time of the execution of the "Sun" contract, and for the reason that the Act of the late Legislature was unconstitutional.

In the McMillan case the latter question was raised, and the further allegation that it was a waste of public revenue.

The Superior Court, all Judges concurring, held said act constitutional, and held further, that the city had the right to make the "Sun" contract. Up to this time the advertisements have been made in both papers, as a matter of safety, and as advised by me. I report these facts in order that you may now instruct the Clerk and City Civil Engineer as to their further action in the matter.

## INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL AND SPECIAL ORDINANCES.

Under this order of business the following entitled ordinances were introduced, and read the first time:

By Councilman Trusler:

G. O. 55, 1889—An ordinance to divide the City of Indianapolis into Wards and Aldermanic Districts, and to establish the boundaries of the same, and to repeal all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict therewith.

Councilman Trusler moved that the above entitled ordinance be referred to a Special Committee of three, to report at the next meeting.

Which motion was adopted, and Councilmen Trusler, Hicklin and Thalman were appointed as such Committee.

## By Councilman Hicklin;

G. O. 56, 1889—An ordinance repealing all such portions of the ordinance passed June 15, 1886, entitled "An ordinance to vacate a portion of Meridian street for Union Railway purposes, also to provide for the building of a foot bridge over the portion of street so vacated, and the building of a viaduct over the Union Railway tracks between Meridian and Pennsylvania streets," as vacate or permit the closing of Meridian street and require the building of a viaduct.

Mr. Tanner, President of the Board of Trade, addressed the Council, and presented the following resolutions relative to the above entitled ordinance; which were read and received:

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, the committee appointed at a meeting of the Board of Trade, and citizens of Indianapolis, held this afternoon, at the Board of Trade Hall, for the purpose of considering the proposed vacation and closing of Meridian street, and the building of a viaduct, respectfully present the following resolutions passed at said meeting

The following resolutions were passed unanimously:

"Resolved, That Meridian street ought not to be closed.

Resolved, therefore, That the ordinance passed June 15, 1886, entitled "An ordinance to vacate a portion of Meridian street for Union Railway purposes; also to provide for the building of a foot bridge over the portion of street so vacated, and the building of a viaduct over the Union Railway tracks between Meridian and Pennsylvania streets," ought to be repealed, in so far as it vacates or permits the closing of Meridian street and requires the building of a foot bridge and viaduct, such repeal, however, not to affect those portions of said ordinance which require the Union Railway Company to indemnify the City of Indianapolis from all liabilities incurred by said city in obtaining the righ of-way for said viaduct, and to reimburse the city for all amounts paid by it in obtaining said right-of-way: Provided, the Union Railway Company consent thereto."

The following resolution was also passed:

"Resolved, That a committee of six be appointed, one of whom shall be the President of the Board of Trade, to present the foregoing resolutions to the City Council."

Whereupon the undersigned were duly appointed said committee.

## By Councilman Johnston:

S. O. 215, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Hill street and sidewalks, from Meridian street to Chestnut street, and for the costs thereof.

# Councilman Coy offered the following resolution:

#### DECLARATORY RESOLUTION.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind., That it is deemed necessary to improve the roadway of Washington street, from the west line of Noble street to the west line of State street, by curbing with stone the gutters thereof, and paving the roadway with Filbert Vulcanite Asphaltic Pavement, as improved by Murdock's Patent No. 394,126, in accordance with profile and specifications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer. The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said Washington street, (except the proportion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis, and except such proportion thereof as eighteen (18) feet bears to the whole width of roadway, which proportion is to be charged to the Citizens' Street Railroad Company.) Said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said assessments, unless the property owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued, all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

And the City Clerk be, and he is hereby ordered, to give the required legal notice to property owners along the line of said proposed improvement, of the time and place, when and where objections can be made to the necessity for such improvements.

O. 216, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading, paving with Filbert Vulcanite Asphaltic Pavement, the roadway of Washington street, bowldering between the rails of the tracks of the Citizens' Street Railroad, curbing with stone the gutters thereof, from the west line of Noble street to the west line of State street, and requiring the Citizens' Street Railroad Company to pay a portion of the cost thereof, as provided for in General Ordinance No. 4, 1884.

## MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

TIMOTHY J. CLARK, a member of the Board of Aldermen, died at his home in this city, Wednesday, November 6th, 1889.

He was born in East Germantown, Indiana, in 1846. In 1883, at the organization of the Metropolitan Police Force of this city, he was appointed to a responsible position on said force, and remained there until 1886, when he was given the position of Deputy Sheriff.

He began his services as a member of the Board of Aldermen on January 1st, 1888, and at the last election was elected for a second term, to begin January 1st, next.

Though born of poor parents, and without special advantages, TIMOTHY J. CLARK made the most of his opportunities, and succeeded well where many others would have failed. He was always courteous and kind, yet fearless in the discharge of duty; the soul of honor, he despised fraud and knavery. Few men had the faculty equal to the deceased, of making and retaining friends.

As a citizen and public official, his record is worthy of emulation, and his untimely death is to be deplored. We extend to the stricken widow and bereaved family our sincere sympathy. To the end that this tribute to the memory of a departed friend may be preserved, be it

Councilman Swain offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvement:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to put in a double stone crossing on the west side of Alabama street, at the crossing of Seventh street. Also, that the Street Commissioner be directed to put in a double stone crossing on College avenue, at Eighth street.

Councilman Long offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Weigh Master be ordered to clean the Hay Market Place within ten days from the passage of this motion.

Councilman Gaul offered the following motions; which were referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to fill all chuck-holes on West street, from Merrill street to Morris street.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to lay a double stone crossing on the west side of West street across Root street.

# Councilman O'Connor offered the following resolution:

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That a special election is hereby called, to take place upon Wednesday, the 11th day of December, 1889, for the purpose of electing an Alderman in the Fourth Aldermanic District, to fill the unexpired term of the late Timothy J. Clark, ending the 31st day of December, 1889, and also to fill the vacancy in the term beginning January 1st, 1890, and ending December 31st, 1892; and the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby instructed to issue the proper notice according to the terms of this resolution, and according to law.

Councilman Darnell moved that the resolution be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney.

That the Indianapolis Brush Electric Light and Power Company be instructed to erect an electric light on the northwest corner of South and Tennessee streets.

Councilman Stuckmeyer offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That a committee of five be appointed by the Mayor, to confer with the Citizens' Street Railroad Company and ascertain on what conditions they will introduce electricity or other rapid transit on their lines in this city,

In compliance with the above motion, His Honor, Mayor Denny, appointed as such Committee, Councilmen Stuckmeyer, Elliott, Markey, Finch and Kelley.

Councilman McClelland offered the following motion; which was referred to the Committee on Public Light:

That the Sun Vapor Light Company be instructed to erect one vapor light on St. Clair street and Bee Line Railroad; also two on Archer street, between Michigan and St. Clair streets, and two on Michigan street, between Archer and Pine streets, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

Councilman Pearson offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Board of Public Improvements be instructed to advertise for bids for a City Dispensary building to be erected on the present site, upon some plan that shall be selected by them; the cost not to exceed \$10,000. Said Board to have power to procure said plan.

#### PENDING ORDINANCES.



"That His Honor, the Mayor, be directed to procure twenty-five copies of 'Picturesque' Indianapolis' for presentation to the South American delegates on the occion of their visit to this city, as said work is a good advertisement for the city."

Would respectfully recommend that the action of the Council be concurred in.
