REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, MONDAY, OCTOBER 10, 1870, 7 o'clock, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—Hon. John S. Newman, President pro tem. in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Harrison, Heckman, Kahn, Marsee, Pyle, Reagan, Shepherd, Thalman, Thoms, Weaver, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—14.

Absent—Councilmen Cottrell, Kennington, Locke—3.

The proceedings of the regular session, held October 3, 1870, were read and approved.

Mr. Thalman introduced Special Appropriation Ordinance No. 55, 1870, entitled:

An Ordinance appropriating money for the payment of sundry claims against the city of Indianapolis.

Which was read the first time.

CALL OF THE ROLL.

Mr. Brown presented the following remonstrance:

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN: We, the undersigned citizens and property owners

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along the line of Louisiana street, between Virginia avenue and East street, also on East street, between Virginia avenue and Georgia streets, also on New Jersey street, between Virginia avenue and South street, also on Virginia avenue, between Louisiana street and East street, having learned that the Indianapolis, Cincinnati & Lafayette Railroad Company, have petitioned your honorable body for permission to remove the switch now located west of Virginia avenue on Louisiana street, we, your petitioners, would respectfully but most earnestly remonstrate against the granting of the prayer of

said petitioners, for the following reasons, to-wit:

First, the removing of said switch will not decrease the obstruction of Virginia avenue, but on the other hand increase it. Again, said Railroad Company do now occupy said Louisiana street with switceing engines, twenty hours in twenty-four, to the great injury of the property in that locality. Again, the granting of said petition will greatly decrease the already depreciated value of property along said street. We can have no rest, day or night, in consequence of the rattling of trains and blowing of whistles, and ringing of bells. Now, gentlemen, we claim the right to the free use and enjoyment of our property, unless deprived of the same by due process of law, and that we cannot be deprived of it without a consideration. Again, said Railroad Company have the right to the use of said street, for only one track, according to the terms of the ordinance granting said Company the right of way, passed April 20, 1852, the first section of said ordinance provides that said Company shall lay but one track in the centre of said Louisiana street from the eastern boundary of the city to Alabama street. Sec. 2 provides that said Company shall procure a sufficient quantity of ground east of East street, to make said Louisiana street eighty feet wide, and shall proceed publicly to open and grade the same eighty feet wide, and that said street shall be a public highway. Again, the ordinance past June 15, 1852, provides that said Company shall construct and maintain all crossings, foot-bridges, gutters, etc. Sec. 2 of said ordinance provides that said Company shall gravel said street ten feet on each side of said track, and shall keep said street in good repair, and we now affirm and declare that said Company have never complied with one single provision of the ordinances granting them the right of way through and upon said Louisiana street; and now, gentlemen, we protest against your granting said Railroad Company any more priveleges on said street, which will prevent us from the free use and enjoyment of our property, which is granted to us by justice and the law.

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be and is hereby instructed to construct suitable culverts on each side of Vine street, where the same intersects with Broadway.

Moved, That the city Commissioners, Committee on Streets and Alleys and City Civil Engineer be, and they are hereby instructed to devise and report the Council a general and Comprehensive system of streets and alleys with the view that the same be adopted to govern the matter in future additions to the city.

Mr. Heckman offered the following motion:

Moved, That the City Marshall notify the Indiana Central Rail-road Company and the Indianapolis and Junction Railroad Company of the passage of an ordinance to place a flagman on the crossing of the Michigan roaid and Orian street.

Mr. Newman presented the following remonstrance:

Indianpolis, Oct. 3, 1870.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN: We, the undersigned property holders, desire to enter our protest against the graveling of Vermont street, between East and Liberty streets, and do petition that the consideration of so much of the ordinance as relates to graveling, be indefinitely postponed.

Mr. Reagan offered the following motions:

Moved, That the action of the Council authorizing the readvertising of the work for improving Louisiana street, from Illinois to

Tennessee streets, be reconsidered, and that the contract be awarded to Hanway & Rubush, at their bid, they being the lowest bidders.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner notify the Indianapolis, Cincinnati and Lafayette Railroad Company, and all other railroad companies whose tracks cross Tennessee street, to build a stone culvert under their tracks on the west side of Tennessee street, at the crossing of Louisiana street, and upon failure of said companies to perform said work within five days from date of notice, that the Street Commissioner perform said work and collect the costs.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner authorize the Glass Company, on Kentucky avenue, to open the gutters beneath their tracks in order to prevent the obstruction of the water therefrom; said opening to be made within ten (10) days from this date, and in case of their refusal or neglect to do said work, the Street Commissioner is directed to have it done, and report the cost of the same to the Council.

Which were adopted.

Mr. Reagan presented the following remonstrance:
