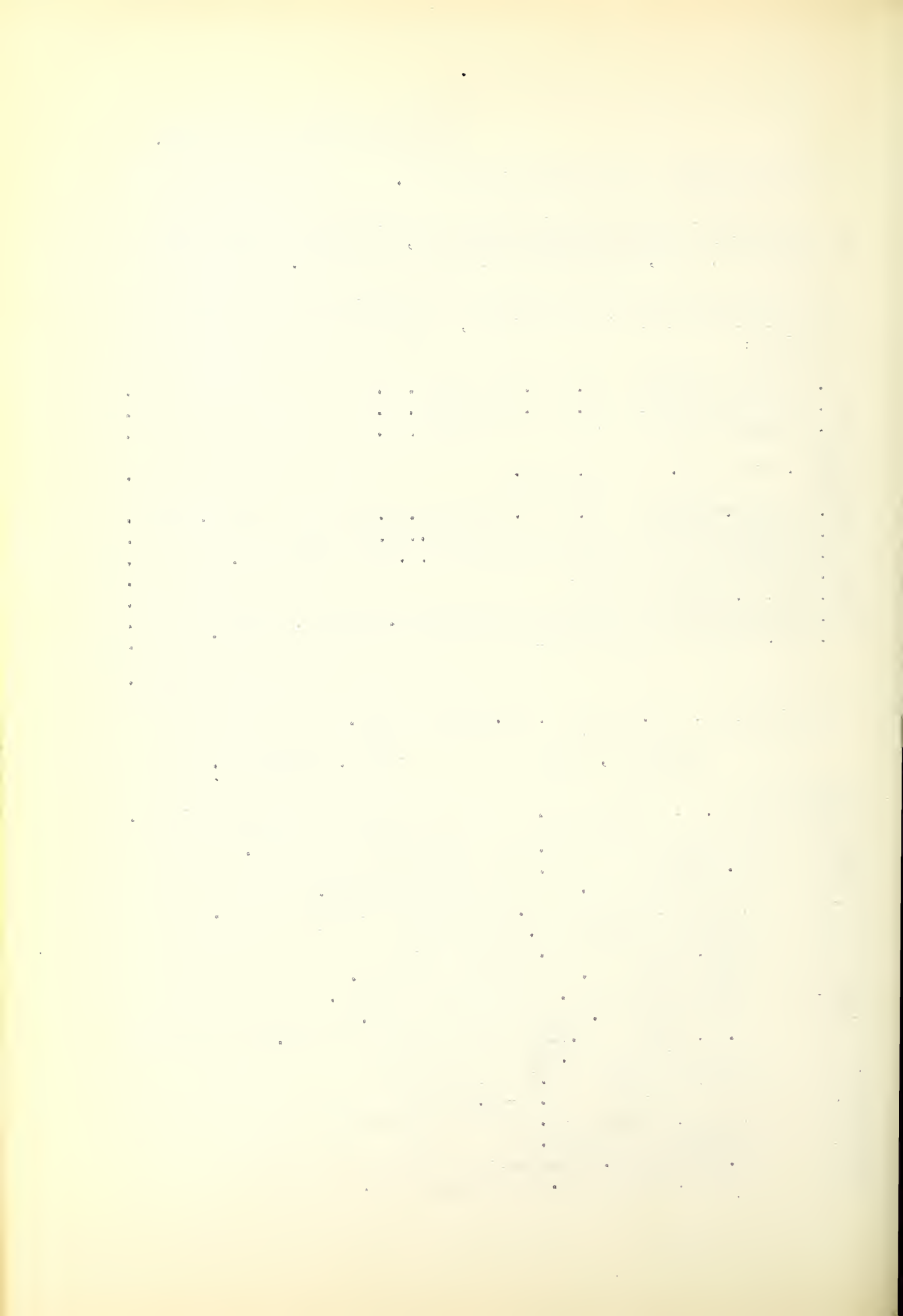

The President laid before the Council a report of City Engineer of a survey and estimate for the drainage of the ditch north of the city of Indianapolis by which it appears that to make a channel from said ditch to Pogues Run the total cost is -----\$2108.54. And to drain said ditch into the Fall Creek by way of the channel already constructed through Johnsons land, the total cost is -- 875.91

A Petition of sundry citizens on New York Street for privilege to make a sidewalk along said street, was read and referred to Comm on Streets.

The Council appointed Messrs. Bates, Gillespie King & the President a committee to enquire into the expediency of providing lamps for Washington Street.

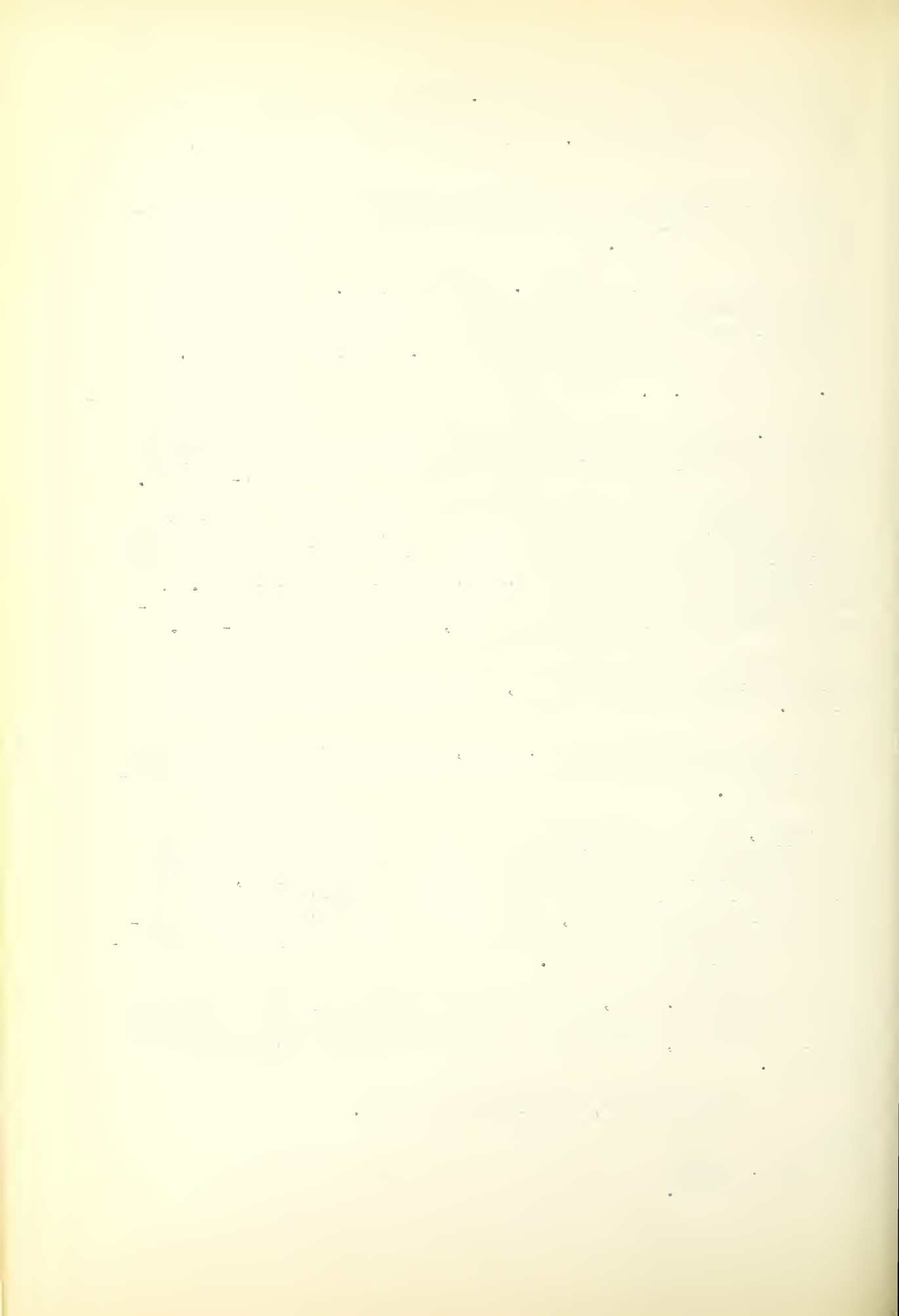

The above data are in good agreement with the theoretical composition of the compound. The melting point is 150°C. The compound is soluble in benzene, chloroform, and carbon tetrachloride. It is insoluble in water and alcohol. The infrared spectrum shows a strong absorption at 1650 cm⁻¹, characteristic of a carbonyl group. The mass spectrum shows a molecular ion peak at m/e 147, corresponding to the molecular weight of the compound.

On motion, the order made for said Grading and Gravelling was suspended until the next regular meeting.

Ordered. That the City Attorney take an appeal on behalf of the council, in the case of the Council vs Blythe & Hedderly recently decided in the Marion court of Common Pleas, to the Supreme Court, and that the order heretofore made on this subject be rescinded.

Ordered. That from and after the 1st of November next, the respective markets of the city be opened at 12 o'clock noon.
