

PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

REGULAR SESSION—MAY 25, 1885.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, May 25th, A. D. 1885, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Brainard Rorison, President of the Board of Aldermen, in the Chair, and Aldermen Bernhamer, Endly, King, McHugh, Prier, Pritchard, and Tallentire—8.

ABSENT, 2—viz. Aldermen Cobb, and Cox.

The Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen for the regular session, held May 11th, 1885, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journals were approved as published.

The following special message was read:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The Common Council, in regular session, held in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, May 18th, 1885, adhered to their former action in recommending the acceptance of \$25.00 from William Brown, in full payment of a street opening assessment against Lot 7, Crane's subdivision of Out-lot 158.

2d. Is a motion "That the Street Commissioner put in two culverts on Indiana avenue, or cut down the crossings on First street and Locke street."

Recommend the crossings be cut down.

We have several motions for putting in street crossings in different locations of the city, all of which we have visited, and find in many places they are needed; but we believe that there should be no expenditure of money in the Department, only in just such places, and for such work as is absolutely necessary, this season.

Recommend that no further action be taken at present.

Hiembrook et al., praying for the opening of Lincoln Lane, from East street to Shelby street, be referred to the City Commissioners, with instructions to assess benefits and damages, and to make due report to the Common Council and Board of Aldermen; the Commissioners to return all petitions and notices. The City Clerk is hereby required to issue the proper notices, and the Superintendent of Metropolitan Police is hereby directed to serve the notices upon the City Commissioners and property owners.

Martin, et al., praying for the vacation of Eleventh street, or so much thereof as will make a uniform width of seventy feet, between Central avenue and the Wabash Railway, be referred to the City Commissioners, together with the plat, with instructions to assess benefits and damages, and to make due report to the Common Council and Board of Aldermen; the Commissioners to return all petitions and notices. The City Clerk is hereby required to issue, and the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police to serve, the proper notice upon the City Commissioners, and the petitioners to serve the proper notices upon the property owners.

Which report was concurred in, and the resolution concurrently adopted, by the following vote:

ad; and that prosecutions will be instituted against each and every company failing to comply with the provisions of the ordinances aforesaid for five days after service of this notice, and will be repeated for each days' delay.

The following motion (see page 269, *ante*), was read, and referred to the Committee on Public Light and Education:

That the City Civil Engineer be directed to re-advertise for the erection of lamp-posts on Yandes street, between Malott avenue and Seventh street, under S. O. 77, 1883.

The following motion (see page 269, *ante*), was read, and referred to the Committee on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to re-plank the sidewalks of Washington street bridge over White River.

The following motion (see page 270, *ante*), was read, amended so as to notify the contractor for the stone work, and then adopted:

That the contractor for the Sixth street bridge be notified that unless the work is rapidly done, the contract will be rescinded.

The following resolution (see page 271, *ante*), was read, and on motion by Alderman Bernhamer, referred to the Board of Metropolitan Police Commissioners, with instructions to enforce the law:

WHEREAS, Persons interested in the manufacture of glue, are in the habit of causing bones, hoofs, horns, and other refuse substances of an objectionable character to be shipped in cars of the C., I., St. L. & C. Railroad Co., and left standing near the corner of said company's tracks and Fifth street, thereby creating a stench which is sickening to the inhabitants of that locality; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the officers of said Railroad company, and the proprietors of the Glue Works, be notified by the Street Commissioner to desist from such practice in the future, and that upon complaint being made by any citizen hereafter, prosecutions will follow against all persons responsible for creating said nuisance.

The following motions (see pages 266, 267, 268 and 271, *ante*), were read and concurrently adopted:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to notify the J., M. & I. Railway Company to plank the sidewalk on the south side of South street, where their tracks cross.

That the Chief Fire Engineer, Board of Public Improvements, City Civil Engineer and City Attorney examine the structure being erected at the corner of Ohio and Davidson streets, for the storage of oil, and see if it complies with the ordinances of the city; and if not, that they serve such notices on the owner as may be proper to save any and all the legal rights of the city to require its removal, or that oil be not stored in it, if the city shall hereafter conclude to prevent its use for the purposes intended.

That the Committee on Public Property be instructed to have the walls and wood work in the City Clerk's office painted, and put in presentable condition.

That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to set stakes for the proper grade of the gutter, from Phipps street to Merrill street, on the west side of Union street.

That the Water Company be requested to remove the fire-plug from the south east corner of Prospect and Olive streets, to a point opposite the Prospect street Engine House; location to be designated by the Chief Fire Engineer.
