### REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, September 18th, 1865,  $7\frac{1}{2}$  o'clock, p. m.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, John Caven, in the chair, and the following members at first roll-call:

Councilmen Allen, Boaz, Brown, Coburn, Colley, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Staub and Thompson—13.

Absent—Councilmen Fletcher, Jameson, Lefever, Schmidt and Seidensticker—5.

The proceedings of the regular session, held September 11th, 1865, and of the adjourned session held September 12th, 1865, were read and approved.

By Mr. Brown—Petition:

Indianapolis, September 18, 1865.

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To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, in behalf of the heirs of Francis A. Costigan, deceased, asks the privilege of building a cistern in the alley adjoining the Oriental House on the south, to hold from 200 to 300 barrels, and pledges himself that the same shall be so constructed that it will be no obstruction to the alley, and in such manner that it can be used by the Fire Department.

Indianapolis, Sept 18, 1865.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

This Indenture, made this September 18th, 1865, witnesseth, that James M. Ray and Sophia P. Ray, his wife, hereby grant, donate and convey to the city of Indianapolis, forever, for a public alley of the city. the following real estate in said city, to-wit: Twelve feet in width on the west side of Delaware street front, south of a line parallel with the north line of Georgia street, extended across the east half of block ninety eight (98) one hundred and eighty-five (185) feet, the same width of twelve feet.

Dr. W. Clinton Thompson introduced special ordinance No. 71, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for furnishing and erecting lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures on Illinois street, between the north side of St. Clair street and the Corporation line north.

Which was read the first time, and, on motion, was read the second time.

Mr. Brown introduced general ordinance No. 17, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE supplemental to an ordinance authorizing the construction, extension, and operation of certain Passenger Railways, in and upon the streets of the City of Indianapolis, passed January 18th, 1864.

Which was read the first time, and, on motion, was read the second time.

Mr. MacArthur moved to lay the ordinance upon the table.

Pending which, the ayes and noes were called for.

The question being on laying the ordinance upon the table, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt and Staub—4.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Allen, Boaz, Brown, Coburn, Colley, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor, Kappes and Thompson—10.

So the ordinance was not laid upon the table.

Mr. Brown then moved that the rules be suspended and the ordinance read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being on the suspension of the rules, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Allen, Boaz, Brown, Coburn, Colley, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor, Kappes and Thompson—9.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Grosvenor, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt and Staub—5.

So the rules were not suspended, there not being a two-thirds vote in the affirmative, as required by rule number 26.

On motion of Mr. Coburn, the ordinance was then referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys.

## Mr. Loomis introduced the following ordinance:

An Ordinance directing the City Marshal to purchase a sufficient number of Settees for the use of the Lobby of the Council Chamber of the City of Indianapolis, and appropriating money therefor.

Section I. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the Marshal is hereby directed to purchase a sufficient number of Settees for the use of the Lobby of the Council Chamber of the City of Indianapolis.

SEC 2. The sum of seventy-five dollars is hereby appropriated to pay for the same to the person from whom said Marshal may purchase said chairs. SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its

GENTLEMEN:—The Committee on Bridges beg leave to report that North street bridge is in a dangerous condition and should be rebuilt immediately.

Also, Market street bridge, which was reported upon some three months since. Market street bridge wants to be raised and a new bent put under each end and re-covered with new plank. North street bridge should be a new bridge entire.

Your Committee would recommend that the Civil Engineer advertise for proposals for the construction of the two bridges mentioned at once.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Which, on motion, was concurred in, and the Civil Engineer instructed to advertise for sealed proposals.

Mr. Colley, from the Committee on Revision of Ordinances, introduced general ordinance No. 18, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Danville Railroad Company to construct a track through the City of Indianapolis, and prescribing the terms thereof.

Which, was read the first time by its title.

The ordinance now being on its second reading.

Mr. Loomis moved to amend by striking out paragraph 8 of the second section, and inserting in lieu thereof, the following:

"8.—That the Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Danville Railroad Company shall not discriminate in the rates charged on all freights per mile, as between Danville, Illinois, and Cincinnati, Ohio, and to the detriment of Indianapolis."

Pending which amendment, Mr. Brown moved that the ordinance and amendment be laid over until the next regular meeeting of Council, and that the Clerk be directed to have the same printed

Which motion prevailed.

From the Civil Engineer-Report:

Indianapolis, September 18, 1865.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The Civil Engineer respectfully reports to the Council:

1st. A profile of McCarty street, between East street and Virginia Avenue,

for your approval.

2d. That C. E. Whittsett, the contractor for grading and paving the east sidewalk on Pennsylvania street, between St. Clair street and the Corporation line north, has completed the same according to contract, and an estimate is herewith reported in his favor for your approval.

3d. That Martin L. Coyner has filed his contract and bond with me for the improvement of Vermont street and north sidewalk, between Pennsylvania and Meridian streets, but has neglected to put on the necessary stamps. I presume he will attend to it when he gets out. I have been informed that he is confined to his house by sickness.

At the last meeting of the Common Council the Civil Engineer was instructed to report an ordinance for lighting the east and west ends and south

side of East Market House.

The Civil Engineer would respectfully recommend that the Civil Engineer be instructed to advertise for the erection of a sufficient number of lamp posts at the above named points; such lamps and posts to be erected under the direction of the Civil Engineer and Board of Public Improvements, as the city will have to pay the whole bill for the erection of the same.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Allen, Boaz, Brown, Coburn, Colley, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Staub and Thompson—14. Noes, none.

So the resolution passed.

### No. 3 received

On motion so much of the report as relates to lighting the east market square with gas, was concurred in, and the Civil Engineer instructed to advertise for sealed proposals for the erection of a sufficient number of gas posts at both the East and West Market Houses to light the same, as in his judgement may be best.

That the Market Master be allowed to pay the bills for work on Market Square out of funds collected for sale of stands.

Which motion prevailed.

## Mr. Grosvenor moved—

That the Street Commissioner be ordered to bridge the gutter on the West side of West street, at the intersection of Maryland street with West street

Which motion was adopted.

Dr. W. Clinton Thompson moved to reconsider the vote referring general ordinance No. 17, to the Committee on Streets and Alleys

Which motion prevailed.

Mr. Brown then moved that the vote on the suspension of the rules for a third reading of said general ordinance No. 17, be reconsidered, but which failed to suspend for want of a two-thirds vote.

Which motion prevailed.

The ordinance then being on the second reading,

Dr. W. Clinton Thompson then moved that the rules be suspended and the ordinance read the third time, and placed upon its passage.

The question being on the suspension of the rules, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Allen, Boaz, Brown, Coburn, Colley, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor, Kappes, Loomis, Schmidt, Staub and Thompson—13.

Councilman MacArthur voting in the negative—1.

So the rules were suspended.

Special ordinance No. 17, as follows:

AN ORDINANCE supplemental to an ordinance authorizing the construction, extension, and operation of certain Passenger Railways in and upon the streets of the City of Indianapolis, passed January 18th, 1864.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the National Road within the limits of the City of Indianapolis, from the point where it intersects West Washington street, west to the east end of the Bridge across White River, on said National Road, is hereby adopted by the City and declared one of the streets of the City of Indianapolis, under

the name of the National Road Street.

Sec. 2. Consent, permission and authority are hereby given, granted and vested unto the Citizens' Street Railway Company of Indianapolis, and their successors, to lay, construct and operate a single or double track for passenger railway lines, with all the necessary and convenient tracks for turn-outs, side tracks and switches in, upon and along said National Road Street from its intersection with West Washington street to the east end of the Bridge

across White River, in the City of Indianapolis.

Sec. 3. It is hereby declared to be the true intent and meaning of an ordinance passed January 18, 1864, entitled "An Ordinance authorizing the construction, extension and operation of certain passenger railways in and upon the streets of the City of Indianapolis," to give to the said Citizens' Street Railway Company, and their successors, permission, consent and authority to lay, construct and operate a single or double track for passenger railway lines, with all necessary and convenient tracks for turn-outs, side tracks and switches, in, upon and along the course of all streets or roads within the corporate limits of the City of Indianapolis, whether named in said ordinance or not: and consent, permission and authority are hereby given, granted and duly vested in said Citizens' Street Railway Company, to lay, construct and operate such tracks in, upon and along the course of all the streets and roads of the City of Indianapolis, together with all streets that may be laid off, or that are now laid off and may be hereafter included in the city between the city of the course o in the city by the extension of the corporate limits of the City of Indianapolis.

That in laying, constructing and operating said track and road on said National Road Street, and all other streets and roads, the said Citizens' Street Railway Company shall be governed by the provisions of said ordinance

hereinbefore named, passed January 18, 1864.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its

Ordained and established this 18th day of September, 1865.

While we respect the rights of the Railroad Company we also have some regard for our own.
