SPECIAL SESSION—MARCH 8, 1886.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, March 8th, A. D. 1886, at eight o'clock, in special session, pursuant to the following call:

Gentlemen.—You are hereby requested to meet in special session, on Monday evening, March 8th, 1886, at 7:30 o'clock, in accordance with the written request this day presented to be by five members of the Common Council.

Councilman Pearson presented the contract and bond of Knight & Jillson, to put in steam heating apparatus in the Market Hall building; which on motion by Councilman Thalman, was referred to the City Attorney and Building Committee on Market House and Public Buildings, with instructions to report at the next meeting.

Councilman Thalman, in behalf of the Committee on Finance, submit the the following report and resolution:

¶WHEREAS, The City of Indianapolis is in present need of funds to meet its current running expenses, which, for the month of March, will amount to the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000); and

Whereas, The city will also need the sum of seven thousand four hundred and forty dollars (\$7,440.00) on the first day of April, 1886, to meet the interest on certain of its outstanding bonds falling due on that day; and

Whereas, The city will also need the further sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) on said first day of April, to take up the time warrants issued on November 2d, 1885; and

Whereas, It has therefore become necessary to provide for such present necessities by making temporary loans in anticipation of the city's current year's revenues; therefore, be it

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That temporary loans to the amount of one hundred and forty-seven thousand four hundred and forty dollars (\$147,440.00) for said city, be, and the same are hereby, authorized and ordered to be negotiated as follows: Said sum of forty thousand

dollars for present use, to be raised upon time warrants of the city for said amount, to be issued and signed by the Mayor and City Clerk, due on or before May 12th, 1886, drawing interest at a rate not exceeding five (5) per cent. per annum from date until paid; said sum of seven thousand four hundred and forty dollars to be raised upon time warrants dated April 1st, 1886, for said amount, to be issued and signed by the Mayor and City Clerk, due on or before May 12th, 1886, drawing interest at a rate not exceeding five (5) per cent. per annum from date until paid; and said sum of one hundred thousand dollars, to be raised upon time warrants dated April 1st, 1886, for said amount, to be issued and signed by the Mayor and City Clerk, due on the 1st day of December, 1886, drawing interest at a rate not exceeding five (5) per centum per annum from date until paid.

We recommend the adoption of the foregoing resolution.

The following message was read, and the action of the Board concurred in:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Aldermen, in adjourned session held in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, March 1st, 1886, adopted the following motion:

"That the Grand Army of the Republic be invited to open the new City Hall building when completed, in a proper and appropriate manner; the proceeds to be devoted to the benefit of the Indiana Soldiers' Monument Fund."

Councilman McGroarty offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That from and after March 8th, 1886, the Finance Committee and City Attorney examine into and report to the Council and Board of Aldermen once each three months, as to the sufficiency of the bond of the Treasurer of the City of Indianapolis.

And it was adopted by the following vote:

That the Street Commissioner is hereby ordered to properly lay double stone crossings down Prospect street, at the intersection of south Linden street.

Councilman Reynolds presented the following petition (accompanied with plat); which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys and the City Civil Engineer; with instructions to report at next meeting:

To the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, trustee under the voluntary assignment of Stoughton A. Fletcher for benefit of his creditors, respectfully shows that under the order of the Marion Circuit Court he has made a plat of certain ground lying east of the City of Indianapolis, on Clifford avenue, to be known as "Windsor Place."

The creditors of Fletcher & Sharpe's Bank are interested in having this plat made and filed at once, as any delay will make it impossible to sell lots to parties who wish to buy and improve them this spring.

In conformity with the act of the Legislature entitled "An act to require plats of new additions to any city to be submitted to the Common Council," etc., approved April 8th, 1885, the undersigned submits said plat to the above named bodies and asks that it be acted on at once, as delay will be harmful to the above estate.

Councilman Thalman offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Engineer be directed to make estimates of the cost of the improvement under both ordinances (S. O's. 29 and 40, 1886), and report soon as possible.

Councilman Markey offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the contractors on the sewer for the new City Hall Building be instructed to not commence work on the same until the Committee on Sewers and Drainage, and the Building Committee on Market House and Public Buildings investigate the propriety of enlarging the sewer, and the committee be instructed to do so, and report at next meeting.

On motion the Common Council then adjourned.

REGULAR SESSION—MARCH 8, 1886.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, March 8th, A. D. 1886, at 7:30 o'clock, in regular session.

The report from the Board of Health for the two weeks ending February 28th, 1886, was read and received.

The report from the Board of Health (see page 136, *ante*), submitting certain Rules, was read and concurrently approved.

The report from the Superintendent of the City Dispensary for February, 1886, was read and received.

The report from the Board of Public Improvements, recommending the disposition of sundry motions (see pages 136 and 137, *ante*), was read, and referred to the Committee on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage.

The report from the Board of Public Improvements and Street Commissioner, showing the monthly expenditures (see page 137, *ante*), was read and received.

The report from the Committee on Finance, authorizing temporary loans (see page 138, *ante*), was read and received.

The reports from the Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney (see pages 138 and 139, *ante*), were read and concurrently approved.

The report from the Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney, on the claim of Wm. H. English, for taxes erroneously assessed and collected (see page 139, *ante*), was read; and on motion by Alderman Pritchard, was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

The report from the Building Committee on Market House and Public Buildings, on the steam heating apparatus for the new City Hall building (see page 141, *ante*), was read and concurred in.

The following motion was read, and referred to the Committee on Public Health:

That the City Clerk be, and he is hereby instructed not to issue a permit for rebuilding or improving what is known as the "Old Carlisle Mill," provided the same is to be used for the use of a green-hide curing establishment. And that it be the sense of this body that any such establishment at that place be considered a nuisance, and the City Attorney be instructed to abate the same, should it be established at that place.

The following motions (see pages 147 and 148, *ante*), were read, and concurrently adopted:

That Christian Fehr be, and is hereby granted permission to grade and pave with brick, the sidewalk in front of his property on the north side of Seventh street, between Illinois and Tennessee streets, at his own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That on and after the first day of May, 1886, the Street Commissioner and all other heads of departments be, and are hereby instructed to enforce the ordinance entitled an ordinance "prescribing that eight hours shall constitute a day's labor by day-laborers employed by the City of Indianapolis," to be found on page 414 of the Revised Ordinances; and that the pay of the same shall not be reduced from the present scale because of such enforcement.

That Catherine Enners be permitted to pave with brick, curb with stone, and boulder the gutters on St. Clair street opposite her own property, said work to be done under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, and at her own expense.

The following entitled ordinances (passed by the Common Council—see pages 145, 146 and 147, *ante*), were severally read the first time:

- G. O. 22, 1885—An ordinance requiring the Wabash, St. Louis & Pacific Railway Company to station and maintain a flagman at the crossing of its track and Christian avenue.
- S. O. 127, 1885—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the sidewalks of Minerva street, from New York street, to north street.
- S. O. 5, 1886—An ordinance to provide for grading, bowldering and curbing the gutters of Broadway street, from Eighth street to Ninth street, and repealing Special Ordinance No. 97, 1885.
- S. O. 11, 1886—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the sidewalks of Seventh street, from Mississippi street to Meridian street, where not already done.
- S. O. 13, 1885—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the north sidewalk of Seventh street, from Meridian street to Central avenue, except paving between Alabama street and New Jersey street.
- S. O. 14, 1886—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the north sidewalk of Second street, from Meridian street to Pennsylvania street.
- S. O. 23, 1886—An ordinance to provide for grading, curbing with stone and paving with brick, the south sidewalk of Fifth street, from Illinois street to Meridian street.
- S. O. 28, 1886—An ordinance to provide for grading, bowldering and curbing with stone and paving with brick the sidewalks of St. Clair street, from Massachusetts avenue to the C., C., C. & I. R. R. tracks.
