REGULAR SESSION.

Chamber of the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Monday, September 4, 1871, $7\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen—Batty, Bigham, Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Craft Marsee, Newman, Reagan, Thalman, Thoms, Weaver, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—17.

The proceedings of the regular session, held August 28, 1871, were read and approved.

Mr. Craft, from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report:

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 4, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred sundry proposals for building stone abutment walls over Pogues Run on South street, have examined the same and find them to be as follows:

August Richter, \$5.95 per cubic yard; Foundation timber, \$1.99 per hundred feet, board measure.

Sam. LeFevre, \$5.70 per cubic yard; foundation timber, \$2.25 per hundred feet, board measure.

Dewey & Twiname, \$6 per cubic yard; foundation, \$2.50 per hundred feet, board measure.

The above bids include the excavation.

Sam. LeFevre is the only bidder for stone arches, which is \$6.75, including excavation, and for the foundation timber, \$2.25 per one hundred feet, board measure.

It will be seen that Sam. LeFevre is the lowest bidder for the stone work, provided the Council conclude to have a Wooden or Iron bridge placed on the abutments, but your Committee believe it would be cheaper to have a stone arch turned over Pogues Run, and in that way save the expense of building any bridge at all at said point, as it would then be permanent and need no repairs. We will leave the same for the Council to decide which it will do, build stone abutements or arch it over.

To the Honorable Mayor and Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana:

GENTLEMEN-The Automatic Fire Alarm Company, of Leetonia, Ohio, being a chartered company under the laws of said State, respectfully propose to furnish and erect, and put in operation in your city, their system of Automatic Fire Alarm and Numerical Police Telegraph, in accordance with the specifications hereunto attached, to-wit: They will furnish the Battery room as per exhibit C, and nine or ten Engine Houses or Hook and Ladder Houses, as described in exhibit D, and fifty Signal Boxes as described in exhibit A, and all the necessary Poles, Insulators and Wire, as described in exhibit G, provided that not over twenty-five miles of Telegraph Line is required. If more than twenty-five miles is required, then in such case the said city shall pay at the rate of two hundred and fifty dollars for every mile of Line Poles or Hitchings or Insulators over and above said twenty-five miles of Line. And all the materials to be furnished under this proposition, shall be of good quality, and the work shall be well done. The said Automotic Fire Alarm Company will commence said work within fifteen days from the signing of the contract, and complete the same within three and one-half months from the commencement of the same, and when the same is completed, the whole shall work substantially as set forth in exhibit H, hereunto attached. The Automatic Fire Alarm Company shall convey to said city of Indianapolis, the necessary license and the right to use all and every patent owned and used, or touching and covering any of the machinery so constructed, together with a satisfactory bond to fully protect said city of Indianapolis against liability to damages for infringements of patents. The said city of Indianapolis shall within ten days from the signing of the contract. locate the said Signal Boxes, provide a Battery Room or Rooms, and grant to the said Automatic Fire Alarm Company, the right of way over the city upon Poles or Buildings, or both, as said city may elect. And when the said system is completed, then the said city through her proper officers shall pay or cause to be paid to the said Automatic Fire Alarm Company, the sum of eight thousand dollars.

On motion, the whole matter was referred to the Committee on Fire Department and Chief Fire Engineer.

On motion by Mr. Brown, the rules were suspended for the purpose of receiving and considering matters in regard to the improvement of North Pennsylvania street.

Mr. Batty presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Sept. 4, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, property owners on North Pennsylvania street, between Second and Tinker streets, show to your honorable body that the present plan for grading, graveling, curbing and paving the said street, between First and Tinker streets, is quite objectionable and will prove wholly inadequate, for the following reasons, viz.: The grade from Tinker street to First street is only - inch to the hundred feet, which is overcome by the inequalities of the dirt or mud gutters, leaving much of the water to stand in the mud gutters during winter, and also in summer after rains. They also show that the curbing will not stand long under the action of the water thus standing in the gutters, and the frost of winter: they show that under the present and progressing plan only twenty feet of the centre of said street, will be covered with gravel, leaving ten feet on each side between the gravel and the curb, which will constitute for a long time, the traveled ways, thus wearing the sides still lower, and creating mud-holes along the gutters. We therefore believe it economy, good policy, and justice to the property owners on said street, to change said plan and contract to the extent and effect of requiring the said street to be graveled thirty feet in the center, and the gutters properly bowldered to the extent of five teet on each side so as to make good gutters next the curb with proper grade to carry off the water.

They show that this is necessary to preserve the work when done, and to prevent mudholes on each side of the street, and save the curbing from falling down, and the water from standing in the sides of the street.

By consent, Mr. Batty, from the Committee on Revision of Ordinances, made the following report:

Indianapolis, Ind., August 28, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—The Committee on Revision of Ordinances, to whom was referred a motion to annex certain platted lands contiguous to the city of Indianapolis, beg leave to report that they have made an examination in the Recorder's office, and find seventeen additions plated and recorded in said office, which are all contiguous to said city, and which have not been heretofore added to the city, a description of which is hereto annexed, together with a resolution of annexation. We would recommend the adoption of the resolution of annexation as herewith submitted.

Your Committee would further recommend that steps be taken at an early day to annex certain grounds not yet platted, so as to make

each of the boundary lines of the city as near straight as possible, and enclosing an area as nearly square as possible.
