# PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

## REGULAR SESSION—November 21, 1887.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, November 21st, A. D. 1887, at 7:30 o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Caleb S. Denny, Mayor, and ex officio President of the Common Council in the Chair, and 17 members, viz: Councilmen Burns, Coy, Cummings, Dell, Dunn, Haugh, Herig, Howes, Markey, McClelland, McGroarty, Reinecke, Reynolds, Smith, Stuckmeyer, Swain, and Thalman

ABSENT, 8--viz: Councilmen Benjamin, Edenharter, Mack, Newland, Pearson Rooker, Smither, and Waterman.

The Proceedings of the Common Council for the regular session held November 7th, 1887, having been printed and placed on thedesks of the Councilmen, said Journals were approved as published.

OPENING AND REFERRING SEALED PROPOSALS FOR PUBLIC IMPROVE-MENTS.

Sealed proposals for the following street improvement were opened and read:

- (S. O. 108, 1886)—For grading, bowldering and curbing the gutters of Pennsylvania street, from Seventh street to Eighth street.
- (S. O. 163, 1886)—For grading and paving with brick, the north sidewalk of Woodlawn avenue, from Spruce street to Reid street.
- (S. O. 166, 1886)—For grading and graveling the first alley east of Meridian street, from Fifth street to the first alley north of Fifth street.
- (S. O. 10, 1887)—For grading and paving with brick, the sidewalks of Sullivan street, from McCarty street to Buchanan street.
- (S. O. 39, 1887)--For grading and paving with brick, the south sidewalk of Biddle street, from Pine street to the C., C., C. & 1. R. R. tracks.
- (S. O 47, 1887)—For grading and graveling Kennington street and sidewalks, from Yeiser street to the first alley north of Yeiser street.
- (S. O. 119, 1887)—For grading and paving with brick, the south sidewalk of South street, from New Jersey street to East street, where not already properly done.

- (S. O. 121, 1887)—For grading, bowldering and curbing the south gutter of Home avenue, and widening the sidewalks thereof, from College avenue to Bellefontaine avenue.
- (S. O. 123, 1887)—For grading bowldering and curbing the gutters of Michigan street, from East street to Delaware street.
- (S. O. 141, 1887)—For curbing with stone the west-sidewalk of New Jersey street, from North street to Walnut street.

On motion by Councilman Swain, the proposals for grading and graveling the first alley east of Meridian street, from Fifth street to the first alley north of Fifth street, were received, and further action thereon postponed. And the proposals for all the other improvements were referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Sealed proposals for furnishing heating stoves for the East Market House, were presented, opened, read, and laid on the table.

#### REPORTS, ETC., FROM CITY OFFICERS.

The City Attorney and City Civil Engineer submitted the following report; which was received:

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, to whom was referred Special Ordinance No. 131, 1887, providing for paving Washington street with Trinidad Asphalt, respectfully report that in obedience to your instructions, we have carefully examined said ordinance, and find that, in our judgment, several changes are desirable. We have therefore dra ted a new ordinance, and submit the same he ewith, which we recommend be substituted for the one now on file, and that said Special Ordinance No. 131, 1887, be stricken from the files.

Said changes include bowldering between the rails of the tracks of the Street Railway Company; the rounding of the curb at street and alley crossings; the removing of catch-basins within the curb line, so as to receive the water through the curb into the basin, and do away with these obstructions at street corners, and other minor changes.

In the investigation of this question, we have visited Cincinnati, Buffalo and other cities. Cincinnati has nine streets paved with asphalt, in all about six miles of pavement, all giving excellent satisfaction, traffic thereon from the lightest vehicle to the large t stone wagons being wholly unrestricted. In fact, the asphalt streets are made to bear far more than their proportion of travel.

The city of Buffalo has a large number of asphalt paved streets, making in all about forty miles of pavement. There, as in Cincinnati, there are no restrictions as to the character of traffic upon the asphalt streets, and like Cincinnati, these streets are burdened with far more than their proportion of travel.

In the city of Buffalo, where asphalt pavements have been in use for the last ten years, there have been no repairs to any of said streets, except where the pavements have been intentionally cut for the laying of pipes, &c. Franklin street, on which about a half mile of asphalt is laid, was put down in 1878; and although subjected to the heaviest traffic, is to day apparently in as good condition as those recently laid. In fact, we could detect no difference between the pavements laid five, seven and ten years ago, and those laid this last year. The city officers informed us that six streets, on which Medina stone had been laid, amounting in all to more than 80,000 yards of pavement, had, on petition of the property holders, been replaced with asphalt, netwithstanding the Medina stone quarries are distant from Buffalo only about twenty miles.

The cost of paving Washington street under this ordinance, we believe will be less than two-thirds of the lowest of the bids last received for improving said street with Medina stone, or in other words, will not exceed \$15.00 per front foot on each

side, excluding curbing.

From the above, and other facts, derived from the experience of other cities, and from the opinion of officials and citizens thereof, as well as from our own personal observation, we are of the opinion that asphalt combines the chief requisites of a good pavement, viz: smoothness, cleanliness, noiselessness and durability. From the nature of its composition, being impervious to water, or chemical matter, it will not absorb liquid filth, as is the case in other pavements, especially wooden block pavements, and is consequently a sanitary pavement; and while it makes a smooth pavement, yet owing to the sand in the composition, it never becomes slippery.

Gentlemen: —I make the following report for your consideration, and await your order on the same:

On November 7th and 14th, the following motion was adopted:

"That the Street Commissioner be directed to lay a sewer pipe in, or near Hill street, from Union street to the sewer in Meridian street."

On examination of said locality, I find it will take about 500 feet of 24-inch pipe to run from the corner of Union street to Meridian street and south, to connect the sewer. The pipe, together with laying, will cost from \$2.25 to \$2.50 per lineal foot, making a total cost of over \$1,250. The distance can be reduced by running southwest across private property, which will lessen the cost. I understand the owners of the property will give their consent to run through their lots.

The Board of Health submitted the following report; which was referred to the Committee on Public Health:

Indianapolis, Nov. 15, 1887.

To the Mayor, Members of the City Council and Board of Adlermen:

Gentlemen:—At the last regular meeting of the Indianapolis Board of Health, held November 5th, 1887, it was decided to suggest the following change in Section two of an ordinance providing for the reporting and burial of persons dying from contagious and infectious diseases:

SECTION 2. It is hereby made the duty of every person who may have charge of any one who has died of small pox or other contagious or infectious diseases, to cause the same to be interred within eighteen hours after the death of any such person, except in special cases, when the Board of Health deem it expedient to require an earlier burial, and notify such persons in charge of the fact.

#### MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

The following message was read, and the subject-matter referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys, City Attorney and City Civil Engineer:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Aldermen, in regular session held in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, November 14th, 1887, concurred in the following report of the Committee on Streets and Alleys and Sewers and Drainage, adopted the amendments recommended by the committee, and then passed the ordinance as amended:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee to whom was referred S. O. 138, 1887, being an ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the roadway and sidewalks, and grading the parks and lawns of Hendricks street, from Nebraska street to Lincoln Lane, has carefully examined the merits of the ordinance, and we find that said ordinance has been drafted by Mr. J hn Coburn, and the same was introduced and passed by the Common Council without being examined by, and without the knowledge of the City Civil Engineer; and that its draughtsman, Mr. John Coburn, has drafted the same to suit himself, and to saddle on the city the liability for one-half of the costs for the said improvement.

The fact is, that the improvement of this street has been before the Common Council and the Board of Aldermen, and several committees, and the City Attorney, etc., time and again, in all different phases, for about two years. (See report of Committee on Streets and Alleys of July 11th, 1887, and Special Committee of September 12th, 1887, in Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, at pages 503 and 635.) In our opinion, the said improvement should be made, and paid for by the owners of the lots bordering on said Hendricks street.

We therefore recommend that Section 1 of Special Ordinance No. 138, of 1887, be amended as follows:

- a. Strike out in line 4, after the word "Park," the words "on the public ground."
- b. Strike out in line 33, all that part after the word "roadway," and also all of line 34 to 46, inclusive.
  - c. Insert in line 50, after the word "said," the words "Hendricks street."
- d. Strike out in line 59, all that part after the word "sewers," and all of lines 60, 61 and 62, which reads, viz: "and the expenses of grading the parks in the

center, and grading and graveling one-half of the roadways, shall be assessed against, and paid by the city."

And after the said ordinance is so amended, we recommend its passage.

## By Councilman Swain:

S. O. 152, 1887—An ordinance to provide for the repeal of an ordinance entitled "Special Ordinance number 166, 1886—An ordinance to provide for the grading and graveling the first alley east of Meridian street, from Fifth street to the first alley north of Fifth street"

## By Councilman Haugh, for Councilman Waterman:

S. O. 153, 1887—An ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering the first alley north of Ohio street, from Delaware street to the first alley east of Delaware street.

#### INTRODUCTION OF MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

Councilman Burns offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That General Ordinance No. 39, 1887, be taken from the Committee on Railroads, and put on its passage.

Councilman Coy offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That there be appointed a committee of three members of the Common Council and two members of the Board of Aldermen, who shall constitute a commission to devise some plan looking to the erection, at an early date, of a suitable building or city offices, city courts, Common Council, station house, &c.

And the Mayor appointed Councilmen Coy, Dunn and Markey as such Committee, on part of the Common Council.

Councilman Dell offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the Street Commissioner notify the property holders on Washington street, between East and Liberty streets, to repair their sidewalks, where needed; and if not done in ten (10) days, that he do the same, and collect the expense of the same from the property holders.

Councilman McClelland offered the following motion, accompanied with petition; which failed of adoption:

Indianapolis, Nov. 21, 1887.

To the Board of Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—An effort is being made to secure the National Convention of the Prohibition party in this city in May or June, next. A delegation from this State will meet with the National Committee at Chicago on the 30th inst., at which time the place of the Covention will be decided upon. The purpose of this delegation is to make as good a showing of the advantages of this city for said convention as possible. With this view, we desire your honorable bodies to inform us as to what will be your best terms for the use of Tomlinson Hall for three or four days, on that occasion.

In view of the fact that natural gas will probably be in general use here at that time, and that delegates will be here from every State in the Union, may we not suggest that the advertisement thus given, will be worth much to the city.

Councilman Reinecke presented the following petition; which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys, with instructions to report at the next meeting:

To the Board of Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, citizens of Indianapolis, respectfully represent that we own all of the real estate abutting upon, or in any manner affected by the vacation of streets and alleys hereinafter named and described, to-wit: So much of the following named streets as lie between the Indianapolis Union Railroad Transfer and Stock Yards Company (Belt R. R.) and Beecher street, in Beaty's addition to the City of Indianapolis, to-wit: Singleton, Gray, Applegate, New and McRoe streets, and the several alleys lying between said several streets, and lying between said railway tracks and Beecher street.

Our reasons for asking the vacation of the parts of said streets and alleys named r is that the several lots abutting on said streets and alleys, have been sold to the Unites States Wire Nail Works, a corporation, which corporation desires to erect buildings for manufacturing purposes upon said lots.

That the nature of such manufacturing is such as to demand buildings of a greater length than can be erected without vacating such parts of streets and alleys, or building across the same.

A plat of said ground and its surroundings is hereto attached, and marked exhibit "A." And we respectfully ask that said parts of streets and alleys so described as aforesaid, be vacated, in pursuance to this petition, and we waive assessment of benefits and damages.
