An ordinance to provide for erecting a lamp-post at the corner of the first alley south of Christian avenue, on the east side of Bellefontaine street.

Was read the third time and passed by the following vote:

Affirmative—Councilmen Batty, Bigham, Bollman, Cottrell, Craft, Gibson, Gimber, Kahn, Pressly, Sherwood, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—13.

Special ordinance No. 116, 1872, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the alley running north and south, between South and Merrill streets, through out lots 18 and 23.

Was read the third time and passed by the following vote:

Affirmative—Councilmen Batty, Bigham, Bollman, Cottrell, Gibson, Gimber, Kahn, Pressly, Sherwood, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—12.

Negative-Councilman Craft-1.

Mr. Cottrell moved that when the Council adjourn it be until Tuesday, August 6th, 1872, 7½ o'clock, P. M.

Which was adopted.

Dr. Woodburn presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, August 1, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Your petitioner understands that there was, on the 3d of June, nearly two months ago, a committee to ascertain at what expense two or more fifty (50) feet streets can be located between Illinois and Meridian streets in St. Clair's addition, and with the least damage to the property owners, and that in pursuance of said appointment, said committee made their report to your Honorable body July 29, nearly two months thereafter.

As a party deeply interested in their report, and in the action of the Council thereon, I beg leave to make a few statements.

1st. Your committee was appointed to ascertain at what cost; this point, so far as the report shows, and so far as I am informed, the committe ignored entirely.

- 2d. Your committee were not appointed to locate a street from Meridian to Pennsylvania street, yet this seemed to be a great burden in their report.
- 3d. Your committee say with regard to the last named: We understand and believe (they did not investigate or they would have known better), that the water is made to flow from Seventh and St. Jo streets, and centre by the grading of Pennsylvania street at or near this point.
- 4th. Your committee say there is 2,172 feet between Second and Seventh streets, so to have the distance properly divided, they make the first division 420 feet, the second 730 feet, the third 930 feet with 80 feet for streets, making the given amount.

With regard to the proposed third street through the grounds of my beloved wife, I am much interested, and propose to show to your Honorable body a better route, a cheaper one, and over less valuable grounds and improvements, and much more equal in distance.

The first is on the grounds of J. M. Lord and Parker, which is about 100 feet north of the one proposed by your committee which has no valuable improvements on, this would make the distance from Second street about 560 feet, and from the proposed Fifth street about 630.

A second point at which a street could be made without injury extraordinary is on a line between —— Parker and E. B. Martindale, about 100 feet north of the last named a distance of, say, 660 feet from Second street, and, say, 530 feet from the fifth street proposed by your committee, and very nearly one-third of the distance from Second to Seventh streets.

And from near either of these points on Meridian, a street could be cut through to Pennsylvania street at a point to which the water centres, referred to by your committee.

Now as to the cheapness of the grounds and improvements, either of the two routes proposed by me has the advantage over the one proposed by your committee for Third street. And to make it positively so, I propose to give to the City the right of way of 40 feet of ground from Illinois street to the East line of my grounds, at either of the two points indicated above and contribute a further sum of \$1,000 toward purchasing the balance of the route. This is to save entire the grounds of Mrs. Hubbard, and, as I betieve, better subserve the interest of the city at large.

I herewith submit a map of the grounds.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, owners of the real estate fronting on Osage Alley, between Washington street and Pearl street, respectfully petition your honorable body to give us permission to boulder said alley under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, the same to be completed in the next sixty days. And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby instructed, to put a picket or board fence around the lot generally designated as the City Park.

Which was referred to the Committee on Parks.
