Monday, Sept. 30, 1872, 7½ o'clock, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Sealed proposals were opened, read and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Heim have permission to pave the sidewalk in front and on the side of his property on the southwest corner of Washington and Alabama streets, and lay the crossings with good oak studding on their edge, said work to be at his own expense, and under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, who is hereby directed to set the grade stakes in conformity to the ordinance passed for the improvement.

In the case of City of Indianapolis vs. Imberry, 17 Ind. 175, the Court says: "The manner in which the order or determination of the Council that a given street or alley, or part thereof, shall be improved, is to be expressed, is not pointed out in the paramount law, but we think it need not be by ordinance. We think it may be expressed by motion or resolution."

It seems, therefore, that a mere motion or resolution is sufficient to secure the improvement of a street or alley.

General ordinance No. 56, 1872, entitled:

An ordinance to provide for placing bells on Fire Engines, Hose Reels and Hook and Ladder Truck.

Was taken up and, on motion, stricken from the files.

General ordinances Nos. 43 and 44, 1872, entitled:

Ordinances to provide Policemen for the prevention of violation of ordinances by Railroad trains, &c.

Were taken up and, on motion, stricken from the files.

Mr. Gibson offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Police Board are hereby directed to add to the present police force two extra policemen for the term of sixty days, whose duty shall be to look after the obstruction of the streets by the railroad trains.

ROLL CALL.

Mr. Bigham offered the following motion:

Moved, That the City Marshal be and is hereby directed to notify Isaac N. Phipps to open Market street its full width to Arsenal street, as per plat recorded in the plat books of the Recorder of Marion county, Indiana; and if said Phipps does not open said street, then the said Marshal shall open the same and charge work to said Phipps, with 10 per cent. damages, and the City Attorney is hereby directed to collect the same by due process of law.

Mr. Bigham offered the following motion:

Moved, That the City Marshal be and is hereby directed to notify the property owners on the north side of Washington street, from Meridian to Noble street, to improve and fix, in a good and workmanlike manner, the sidewalks in front of their property. They, the said owners or their agents, failing to do so within 20 days, the City Street Commissioner is hereby directed to fix the same at the owners' expense.

Moved, That John L. Marsee be allowed to grade and pave with Lefler paving stone, in front of his property on South and New Jersey streets, and the Civil Engineer is hereby directed to set the grade stakes.

Moved, That Christian F. Neiman be permitted to gravel Lockerbie street, in front of his property, at his own expense and under the direction of the Civil Engineer, who is hereby instructed to set the proper grade stakes.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, owner of lots No. 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 37, \$8, 39, 40, 41 and 42 of out-lot No. 28, fronting on Willard street, respectfully remonstrates against the passing of an ordinance (introduced before the Council Sept. 24, 1872), for grading and graveling Willard street between Garden and Merrill streets, for the following reasons, to-wit:

1st. Willard street, except a portion near the line of Pogue's Run, was graded and graveled in 1870.

- 2d. There is now no bridge crossing Pogue's Run on Willard street, and if the street be graded and graveled up to the run, it will leave an embankment on each side of the run, with $12\frac{1}{2}$ feet of a jump-off, and it would be impossible for a team to pass over; besides, the first freshet would carry all of the new dirt and gravel away, while as it now is there is a gap and slope on either side of the run sufficient to allow the water to pass.
- 3d. No person owning a single foot on the street where it has not already been graded and graveled, has signed any petition asking your honorable body to make such improvement—the ground on both sides of the street, where not already graded and graveled, belonging to me.

See the plat herewith presented, showing where the street has already been

graded.

I feel that I must protest against such improvement until a bridge is provided to cross Pogue's run, so as to make the street a thoroughfare, or of any benefit. Thus I will ever pray, &c.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned residents of North Meridian street, between New York street and First street, do hereby remonstrate against the granting by the City Council of a petition to pave said street with Nicholson or block pavement, for the following reasons:

It is the most expensive street to construct and most costly to maintain.

We have recently paid for improving said street under the direction of the city officials, and feel it an injustice to compel us to tear it up and replace it with a fancy article.

Our taxes are so high already for city purposes, that we must object to the addition of unnecessary burdens.

Moved; That the Chief Fire Engineer be authorized to lower the crown of the cistern at the intersection of Noble street and Fletcher avenue.
