APPLYING RESEARCH TO PRACTICE

The UIC Library of the Health Science Experience by Karen Dahlen, Head of Information Services

First Year Medical Students

For the past three years, the UIC Library of the Health Sciences (LHS) and the Department of Medical Education have been surveying the computer knowledge and skills of first-year medical students. Last year (1992) medical schools at Northwestern and the University of Michigan joined us to see if there were similiarities or differences that existed among students. Results of this study have been used in a variety of ways: to support grant applications, to determine goals (for both the Library and the College of Medicine), and to strengthen the Library's plan in support of educational reform.

An article is underway for publication.

Consumer Health Study

The LHS expects the number of consumer requests related to health to increase significantly over the next few years. To better understand current practices in relation to potential roles for libraries in delivering health information, Information Services librarians completed a pilot study during 1993. Large public libraries were surveyed to determine trends, such as basic composition of collections, referral policies, and service policies. The results of this pilot study were presented at the Midwest Chapter Meeting in Louisville. After the survey instrument is revised, plans are underway to sample both public and health sciences libraries.

Gerontology Needs Assessment

The LHS and the Illinois Geriatric Education Center (IGEC) have developed a collaborative working relationship to better understand knowledge and use of databases by gerontology practitioners. In 1991 and 1992, needs assessments were conducted during the IGEC Summer Institute. Findings revealed that practicing gerontologists spend excessive time seeking information. More than 50% said they spent from one hour to more than one day satisifying information needs. In both cohorts more than 60% reported no familiarity with databases on aging. Outcomes of the study include the need for more participation on behalf of the library, demonstrations of databases as part of training programs, and an information services proposal as part of the funded IGEC grant. Results of that survey were presented at the AGHE (Association for Gerontologists in Higher Education) meeting in Baltimore (February 1992) and at the Annual Meeting of GEC's in St. Petersburgh, Florida (August 1992).

Metropolitan Information Referral Network

The purpose of this project is to design a database of policies endorsed by health sciences libraries and information centers in the greater Chicago area to improve referral service. Currently, a prototype database has been designed to capture the data, guidelines have been established for collaboration, and semi-annual meetings have been held to collaborate with members.
